CURRENT NEWS

Christmas/New Year break - Welcome back to the Club for 2024. I trust everyone had a happy and healthy festive season. Workshop sessions are all under way and numbers are high in all groups.

Christmas Shop - Because of the success of the Christmas Shop, the Committee will be considering the value of having an Easter Shop at the Clubrooms. At Easter we also have other possible activities. The Churchill Island Festival returned last year and we were involved, although we haven't heard anything yet for this year. Bunnings have invited us to participate in an Easter Family Night on Thursday 28th March. Committee will discuss this next week.

Shipping container and new workshop - We have been offered a Grant of \$1000 by Bendigo Bank to contribute to the installation of a 40' shipping container. This will be used for storage of wood and other items that are cluttering our workshops. We have written approval from BCAL and groundworks, container and transport quotes are now in. The project will get underway shortly. Our current priority though is still the proposed new workshop and our application for a substantial contribution from a Vic. Govt. Mens' Shed Development Grant, which we missed out on in 2023, but are hopeful of obtaining this year. We have written approval from BCAL and BCSC. However there is a huge amount of work still to be completed - various quotes, engineering plans, building approvals, financial arrangements and grant applications are being pursued. Our aim is to have all our ducks in a row for the round of State Men's Shed grants later in 2024.

Bunnings Sausage Sizzles - A big thank you to Peter and Alex for continuing the organisation and running of our Bunnings events. Our next Sausage Sizzle is this coming Saturday 27th January. As it's a long weekend we are hopeful of doing well. When I last looked there was one space for the afternoon shift. Let Peter know if you are prepared to do that one or be on stand-by in case someone has to cancel.

Members' Meetings - The regional FESTOOL rep. will be speaking and demonstrating at our Members' Meeting on 12th Feb. so put that in your diary. Festool also distribute SawStop now and I understand

have incorporated SawStop technology into some of their own saws.

SAFETY FIRST IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY EACH AND EVERY

ONE OF US

As everyone is aware we had an unfortunate accident on a table saw last week. So it is appropriate that we spend a little time and space to re-visit the importance of OH&S at the Woodies. I would ask all members to have a careful read through the following few pages to better understand and acknowledge the rules and guidelines that are in place at the Club.

All this is to ensure your own personal safety and wellbeing as well as that of your work companions and mates at the Woodies. No rules are put in place for the sake of it - they're there to best protect us all.

PLEASE TAKE ANY HEALTH AND SAFETY REQUIREMENTS SERIOUSLY AT ALL TIMES.

<u>NOTE</u> - The committee will prohibit either directly, or through a nominated person (Workshop Session Supervisor, Instructor or the OH&S Officer), any member from using, or operating any machinery or equipment, if in the opinion of the committee or their nominated person, the member is not working safely or acting in accordance with Club rules and policy. <u>Please be aware this will be definitely apply if considered necessary</u>.

Make yourself aware of where all of the following are -

The First Aid kits/cabinets - There is a kit/cabinet in each workshop and on the wall just inside the door of the meeting room.

The first aid kit supplies will be kept updated by the O H &S Officer.

A Defibrillator is located beside the meeting room first-aid cabinet. This machine is fully automated, so in the case of an emergency, cardiac arrest or other suspected heart issue, just turn the machine on and the voice guidance will support it's application.

In case an ill or injured person needs to lie down, a first aid blanket, pillow and thermal blanket are also available in a clear zippered bag beneath the meeting room first aid cabinet.

Any use of first aid materials (yes, even bandaids), must be recorded in the book on top of the meeting room first aid cabinet, so that supplies can be replenished.

There is an Accident/Serious Injury Register in the labelled folder on the bookshelves. Please complete this form if an accident occurs where doctor/ambulance/hospital is required. Any incident that requires major first aid/ doctor, ambulance or hospital treatment **must be** detailed on a form from this register. It is the responsibility of the appropriate workshop supervisor in liaison with the OH&S Officer to make sure this is completed. It must be completed by a witness and anyone who supported with first aid treatment. Please ensure it is detailed and accurate, as this is a legal document.

Incident Report - following any injury, near miss, property damage, environmental issue or other health and safety related incident, a report must be completed and filed. This should be signed off by the workshop supervisor in charge, a witness or other authorised member. These forms are also in a specially labelled folder.

First-aid training. From time to time and usually every two years, Level 1 First Aid Training/use of defibrillator/ CPR will be offered to members. This is usually funded by means of a Grant. If someone wants to do personal First Aid training through BCAL, for the benefit of the Club, recompense for costs/partial costs for this may be approved by Committee.

A bucket, mop and cleaning materials are in the meeting room – rear right corner.

PIER SAFETY

For any Medical emergencies and Fire immediately call 000

Club Location for Emergency Services – Rear of Jean Meltzer Centre, Bass Coast Adult Learning Campus - 239 White Road Wonthaggi. Nearest intersecting streets are Sherwood Court and South Dudley Road.

Responsibilities of Workshop Supervisors in cases of emergency

Alarm will be given orally. If an emergency exists, the first person that identifies the emergency will give the alarm and respond as directed by their Workshop Supervisor/ O H &S Officer (or qualified first aider if appropriate).

Where is our evacuation area? At the White Road end of the BCAL car park.

Where are fire extinguishers located? In each workshop and in the meeting room. Look for them and read the details on the adjacent signs.

Where are the emergency electrical cut off buttons? There are two of these in the turning workshop. If the cut-off is activated, only a Supervisor is authorised to re-set the power, and only after appropriate checks are made to determine what caused the failure. If there is a problem that can't be safely rectified or explained, the cut-off button should not be re-set. The O H &S Officer should be notified and an electrician called if deemed appropriate.

WORKSHOP RULES

- 1. NEVER speak to or otherwise distract anyone using a machine. Unless you are an approved Supervisor assisting, do not encroach into the space of machine operators ANY MACHINE! When you work in a woodcrafting workshop you are surrounded by potentially dangerous tools, so it is important to focus on your task and avoid distractions such as conversation. If you are working with a power tool, finish the cut to a safe conclusion before looking away. Preferably turn the machine off before conversing. If you need to move away from a machine for any reason ALWAYS TURN THE MACHINE OFF.
- 2. Wear appropriate PPE. Full face masks are mandatory when using a lathe. Safety glasses, hearing and dust protection with all other machines.
- 3. Wear appropriate clothing avoid loose-fitting clothing and dangling jewellery as it could become tangled in a saw blade, cutting head or workpiece. Wear clothes that will protect your body from flying wood chips.
- 4. No open shoes may to be worn in workshops <u>at any time</u>. Solid shoes are highly recommended rather than sneakers or similar.
- 5. Drugs and medications if you are taking any medications, ensure you know what side effects these may have that could affect your focus, concentration or ability to use machines. Take yourself away if you don't feel well and speak to your session Supervisor.
- 6. Ask for support, assistance and advice don't venture past your skill, knowledge, experience and ability levels. This is different from being creative, which is encouraged, but again always seek advice and support when trying something new.
- Take tea breaks at designated times. At the Woodies we have a break midway through every workshop session. This is not just to socialise, but also to ensure focus and concentration can be maintained. <u>No</u> <u>machines may be used during designated break times</u>.
- 8. No-one is to work without 2 other Woodies members present in the workshop. A Supervisor must always be present in a regular scheduled woodcrafting session.
- 9. Strictly, only financial members may use Club workshops and equipment to ensure our Insurance



requirements are met.

10. Keeping workshops tidy , dust free with no slip or trip hazards, is a safety measure that must not be under rated.

11. A full clean up - sweep and vacuum - of all machines and areas used in a session must be completed by <u>all participants</u>. This applies even if you depart before the end of a session.

12. Any equipment borrowed for use from cupboards, drawers or racks must always be returned to its correct storage area after use.

13. Members must always follow the directions of Supervisors, who have the authority of the Club Committee to enforce safety rules and procedures.

- 14. Members may not use the following machines without direct supervision of a Supervisor before undertaking training and being signed off by the Club's OH & S officer. Lathe, table saw, thicknesser, bandsaw, jointer, router table, sliding compound mitre saw. Some equipment is key locked for safety and maintenance reasons eg. the drum sander. If you wish to use these items, see a Supervisor to unlock.
- 15. Report any incidents, damage, faults or possible safety hazards as soon as they are noticed, to a Supervisor, or the OH&S Officer.
- 16. Heed all Health & Safety notices around the Workshop. They refer not only to your safety, but also the safety of other Members around you.
- 17. If you are unfamiliar with the use of any workshop tools, equipment or accessories, speak to your Supervisor before attempting to use them.
- 18. As all our lathes are now electronically speed controlled, before placing any load on a lathe, check the speed setting of the machine is appropriate. At the end of a wood turning session, turn the speed dial back to zero for the safety of the next operator. <u>Check it is turned the right way!</u>
- 19. We are all members of the Wonthaggi Woodies to enjoy the friendships and social interaction as well as to participate in our common interest woodcrafting. We can all learn from each other, support each other and have a laugh (often at our own expense). But let's do this in a safe and harmonious manner and ensure the Wonthaggi Woodies continues to be a great Club to be part of.
- 20. NOTE all buildings and immediate surrounds in the Jean Melzer precinct are strictly non-smoking.

Slicing Through Steel - Easily!

I was given some discarded table legs the other day. In very good condition too. I decided to slice through the middle of one leg using the large band saw at the club to see what type of timber the legs were made of. The band saw took the first two or three centimetres very easily and then hit a light resistance. Initial thoughts were that I had hit some internal knots in the wood and the saw was still cutting reasonably easily, so I continued slicing the length of the leg.

To my utter surprise, as I spread the two halves apart, I had not only sliced the timber leg in half but the saw had also sliced through a 70mm long internal bolt. Dead centre too!! See photos.

Not only was the bolt totally hidden in the top square section of the leg, but interestingly, the metal detector also failed to detect the internal bolt. Pretty amazing really, in more than one way! John DiStefano

UPDATE - Robert Millard's Yacht

The yacht in picture below is being built by Woodies member, Robert Millard. Robert has been a member for many years and was instrumental in initiating our furniture/joinery workshop sessions, which have gone from strength to strength.

This is an update on how Robert's current yacht construction project is progressing. The last update and photos were in the September 2022 edition of our Newsletter.

Robert has plenty of experience with yachts. Previously he purchased a larger yacht, spent a year customising it, then he and his wife Claire sailed around the world for 2 years. The current project is much smaller, but challenging. It is a ClassGlobe 5.80. Robert began building it in his garage at Cape Woolamai from plans and CNC cut, kit components. When he taped out the measurements on the floor, it fitted in by a matter of centimetres at each end - and that was after having to dispose of some of his precious woodworking machines to make space. Since then it has been moved to a larger premises by necessity.

Robert says there are three major differences from his previous woodworking. 1) The use of compound angles and curves rather than square construction; 2) All jointing is secured with two pot epoxy and 3) New skills have been required with fibre glassing, electrical planning and wiring, plumbing, etc. - in fact a new skill around every corner. Robert's hoping to get the boat on the water by about late March 2024 and has a berth waiting at Newhaven.
