Library Matters

Members are well aware of the dangers of using the fence and the mitre slide at the same time on the table saw and on the band saw. However it is very handy at times when wanting to cut multiple pieces of the same size on the table saw to clamp a block of

scrap wood onto the fence before the the sawblade to set the correct distance for the cut.

By doing this, of course, it leaves plenty of room at the sawblade for movement in the piece cut thus avoiding the chance of the piece cut jamming between the turning blade and the fence.

Fine Woodworking last month sent a short video on making a simple stop block with strong earth magnets to do away with clamping a block of wood to the fence. The article advised

“To avoid clamping of any kind, I created a stop-block with four rare-earth magnets embedded in the base. The block is placed against the fence and sticks securely to the cast-iron table. I use this quick, handy stop on my bandsaw too, where I don’t feel good about applying clamping pressure to the extruded aluminium rip fence.”

A Boating Tail.

For about 20 years a Chinese Junk took tourists on Junk rides around the waterways of Port Macquarie. However when in Port Macquarie in May the Junk was spied on the slips near the Hibbards Ferry terminal as seen in the photo at right. This reminded me that in around 1960 when working for Hungerford Spooner & Co Chartered Accountants I was directed to investigate what the listed company Motels of Australia Ltd had acquired when their takeover bid for Carapark Holdings Ltd was successful.

At the time Motels of Australia operated 3 Travelodge motels and was building a fourth at Bondi. Carapark Holdings on the other hand was in some financial difficulties and purportedly operated the largest caravan manufacturing business in the south hemisphere, 27 Caravilla motels, the Brampton Is Whitsundays resort, the Brampton Princess converted WWII PT boat and two Chinese junks. I could not recall what happened to these Junks.

Was the Port Macquarie Junk one of them. Well upon enquiry from the former skipper of the Junk who I interrupted having a cuppa while his wife was adding some paint to a boat advised me that the Port Macquarie junk was imported into Australia in 1976 by Levi Jeans for promotion purposes around Sydney Harbour before being sold to the present owner who has rescued it from being a rotting hulk. The present owner when he first purchased the Junk from Levi Jeans operated the Junk on tourist waterways tours for about 8 years. He sold it and the business. Over the next 12 years the business had a number of owners the last of whom went broke and the junk was left to rot. He then bought the junk back last year and now is restoring it. Will we see it again plying its tours on the Port Macquarie waterways?

Why this story? We have few boat building members so thought they may consider building a junk for their next project. The mystery still stands as to what happened to the Brampton Is junks. Ed.

Also what happened to the Brampton Island Resort. Wikipedia reports that Motels of Australia sold it in 1961 to the McLean Family (Roylen Cruises). Then it was purchased by TAA who sold it to P&O Resorts in 1997. They then sold it to Voyages Indigenous Tourism who then sold it to United Petroleum in 2010 who were to redevelop the resort. The resort was closed in 2011. We understand it has not been redeveloped and has not reopened to this day.

A SAFETY GUARD FOR OUR LINISHER

At our May Committee meeting a safety issue was raised about the Club's linisher. Particularly relating to the sanding bed extending into the passage between machinery. It meant that when somebody was using the disk sander the belt sander was also operating and open to somebody walking past contacting the revolving belt.

The issue was of course is this area of the belt sander is area often used and part of the linishers benefits. Therefore any cover had to be easily removed when the sanding belt was being used.

Neil Mathews came to the rescue and advised "I just completed today a guard for the belt sander and thought I may as well include a write-up on it as well.

Guard for Belt & Disc Sanding Machine.

On Ian's suggestion of a possible type of guard for the end of the belt-sanding machine, I was asked if I could make the guard.

I used 0.9mm stainless steel for the guard, which I cut out with my angle grinder. I used my bench vice and a piece of 60mm as a former to bend and shape the sheet.



The ends of the cut sheet were then bent at right angles to go over the sides of the machine. I considered it necessary to be able to adjust the height of the guard so that the flat section of the guard was as close to belt as possible. To achieve this, I used two pieces of 8mm threaded rod and locknuts. This requires two holes to be drilled into the machine and tapped to M8. I also wanted the guard to be easily removed, so I drilled and tapped M5 holes into the ends of the threaded rod. When installed, the M8 threaded rods will be rotated to the appropriate guard height and secured with M8 locknuts. I then decided I needed a surface bigger than the end of a 8mm rod as a clamping surface. There was not enough room for another M8 nut so I made two 3mm locking washers with a 20mm hole saw and tapped these to M8. These washers were then aligned with the ends of the threaded rod and secured with super glue.

The guard is then attached to the threaded rods and the machine with two M5 Thumb Screws."




OUR LASER CUTTER/ENGRAVER UPDATE REPORT.



HOW TO SHARPEN AND USE THE STANLEY CABINET SCRAPER



1. TO SHARPEN A BEVEL EDGE SCRAPER BLADE REMOVE THE OLD BURR WITH A SMOOTH MILL FILE HELD FLAT AGAINST THE FACE OR FLAT SIDE OF THE BLADE

2. FILE OR GRIND A BEVEL OF ABOUT 45°. PUSH THE FILE FORWARD AND TO THE SIDE WITH ONE SLIDING MOTION

3. WHET THE BEVEL SIDE OF THE BLADE ON THE OIL STONE

4. WHET THE FACE SIDE OF THE BLADE TO REMOVE THE WIRE EDGE

5. DRAW THE EDGE WITH A FEW FIRM STROKES ON THE FACE SIDE OF THE BLADE. HOLD THE BURNISHER FLAT ON THE FACE SIDE OF THE BLADE

THE CABINET SCRAPER IS USED FOR THE FINAL SMOOTHING BEFORE SANDPAPERING. IT REMOVES THE SLIGHT RIDGES LEFT BY THE PLANE. IT IS ALSO USED TO SMOOTH SURFACES THAT ARE DIFFICULT TO PLANE BECAUSE OF CURLY OR IRREGULAR GRAIN.

TURN THE EDGE WITH A FEW FIRM STROKES OF THE BURNISHER ON THE BEVEL SIDE OF THE BLADE. THE SCRAPER CAN BE HELD IN ANY OF THE THREE WAYS SHOWN ABOVE. DRAW THE BURNISHER TOWARD YOU THE FULL LENGTH OF THE BLADE WITH A SLIDING STROKE. SOME PREFER TO STROKE BOTH WAYS FROM THE CENTRE TOWARD THE ENDS. A DROP OF OIL ON THE BURNISHER HELPS.

TO ADJUST AND USE THE CABINET SCRAPER LOOSEN THE ADJUSTING THUMB SCREW AND THE CLAMP THUMB SCREWS. INSERT THE BLADE FROM THE BOTTOM WITH THE BEVEL SIDE TOWARDS THE ADJUSTING THUMB SCREW.

BRING THE EDGE OF THE BLADE EVEN WITH THE BOTTOM OF THE SCRAPER BODY BY STANDING IT ON A FLAT SURFACE AND PRESSING THE BLADE LIGHTLY AGAINST THE WOOD. TIGHTEN THE CLAMP THUMB SCREWS 'a' BOW THE BLADE BY TIGHTENING THE ADJUSTING THUMB SCREW 'b' TO MAKE IT PROJECT ENOUGH TO TAKE A THIN SHAVING. IF ONE CORNER OF THE BLADE PROJECTS TOO FAR, IT CAN BE DRAWN IN BY TAPPING THE SIDE OF THE BLADE NEAR THE TOP.

TRY THE SCRAPER AND CHANGE THE ADJUSTMENT UNTIL IT TAKES A THIN EVEN SHAVING. HOLD IT TURNED A LITTLE TO THE SIDE TO START A CUT. THE CABINET SCRAPER IS USUALLY PUSHED BUT IT CAN BE PULLED. DUST, INSTEAD OF A SHAVING, INDICATES A DULL SCRAPER.

Peter advised "First is a rack to store and carry a pair of 2kg exercise weights made as a birthday present for my sister-in-law. All joins doweled for extra strength. 19mm pine from Bunnings finished with Cabot's Cabothane Clear Satin.

Second is a suitcase to carry two bottles of wine made as a birthday present for my other sister-in-law. Engraved using STATEPARK font templates from ROCKLER (now available from Carbatec). Unfortunately, the case didn't fit the bottle size that sister-in-law normally drank. 19mm pine from Bunnings for top and bottom and side pieces trimmed down to about 17mm and finished with Cabot's Cabothane Clear Satin.

Lastly is a small suitcase for the choir leader at the local church for the sheet music. This is of dual wood construction. Pine from Bunnings is the lights coloured wood, while the darker coloured wood was "whatever

Peter's childhood bed was made out of.....". 4mm thick plywood top and bottom. Also finished with Cabot's Cabothane Clear Satin."
