It just needs a handle for the drawer which he can source now that the lockdown is easing. The table is made from cedar and finished with shellac which has highlighted the beautiful colour and grain. The most difficult task was the inlay stringing on the tapered legs, but for a first attempt, he is reasonably satisfied and already thinking of his next project. Well done Alwyn. It really does look great. Note the beautiful dovetails in the drawer.



Pictured below are pictures of a Workbench made by **Peter Haynes**. It has been 2 years in the making and is made entirely of scrap timber that Peter has collected over the years. The Workbench sits on stand which has wheels. Peter collected the stand some 35 year ago and finally found a use for it. The workbench has 2 fronts and is easily turned around (because of the wheels) if you wish to use the other side. One side has a slide out bench top which reveals sand paper underneath to make sanding your work much easier.



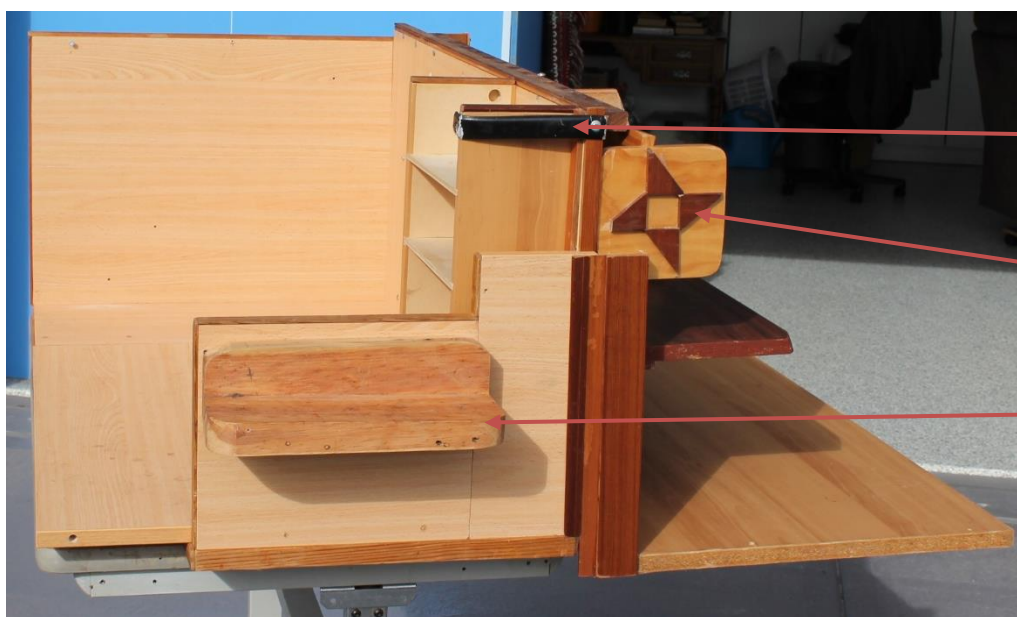

Above is a view from the other side of the workbench showing additional storage spaces and a spot for a vice.

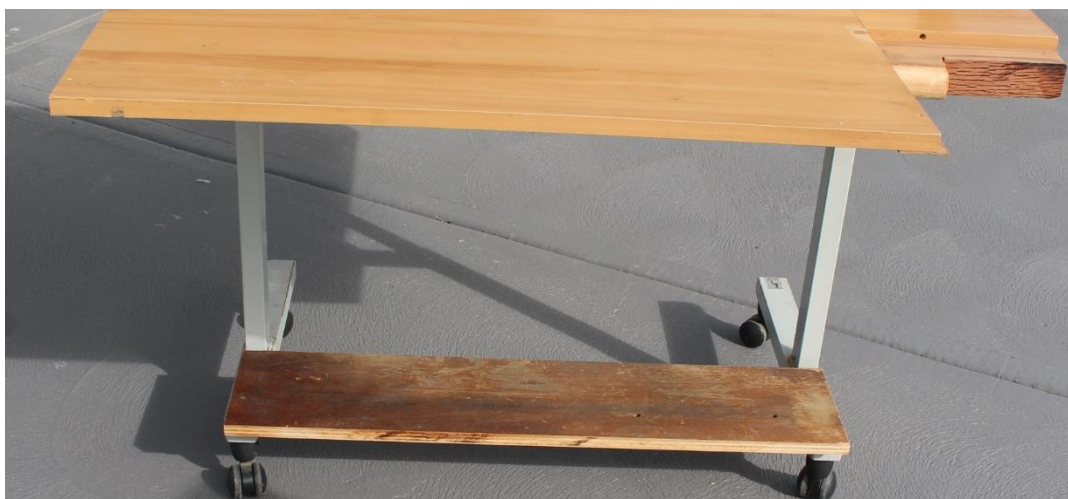


A close-up of the picture above shows a rack at the top to store chisels, gouges, screwdrivers, etc. Note that there is even one at the end to store a wine glass.

Finally, below is a photo of the stand on which the workbench sits. Note the wheels and the board on which to rest your feet. Peter has put a lot of work, effort and thought into the workings of the workbench and, although he made it for his own use, he no longer requires it and it is, therefore, available to any Club Member **free of charge**. Peter may even be able to deliver it.

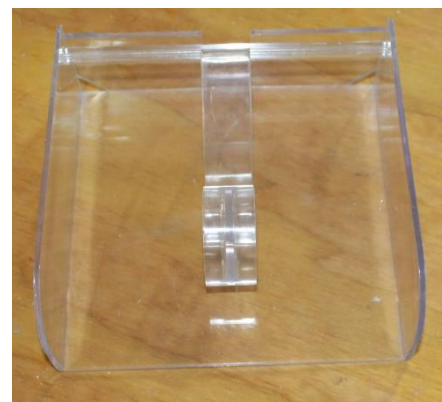

# Brush Box



**BOTANICAL NAME:** *Tristania conferta*

**OTHER COMMON NAMES:** Pink Box, Queensland Box

**TREE DESCRIPTION:** Brush Box is a large hardwood often found fringing rainforest areas. It grows from just south of Sydney on the coast of NSW up to North Queensland and generally reaches heights up to 40m (132ft) and diameters up to 2m (6ft), though it is capable of growing much larger.

**COLOUR:** The heartwood is light to medium pinkish-brown with a sapwood of lighter colour, usually distinguishable.

**GRAIN AND TEXTURE:** Grain is usually interlocked, producing a curly figure, although this can vary somewhat. The texture is fine and even.

**DENSITY:** Air dry density is approximately 900kg/m<sup>3</sup>.

**STABILITY:** Brush Box exhibits a medium amount of movement and is moderately stable in service.

**DURABILITY:** The sapwood is not usually attacked by the Lyctus borer. The heartwood is moderately durable but has good resistance to termite attack.

**WORKING PROPERTIES:** Brush Box is a very hard and strong wood of high density which has excellent wearing properties. It is usually difficult to work with a medium to high cutting resistance and high blunting effect on tool edges. It is moderately difficult to nail but usually without splitting. Screw holding ability is good. Usually glues well but its slight oily nature should be taken into account for glueing and some finishing. The wood is generally not suitable for steam bending. Planer blade angle may need to be reduced. A clean surface can be produced and worked to a high polish. Some uses of Brush Box have included flooring, bridge decking, pulley blocks, woodworking tools and cladding.

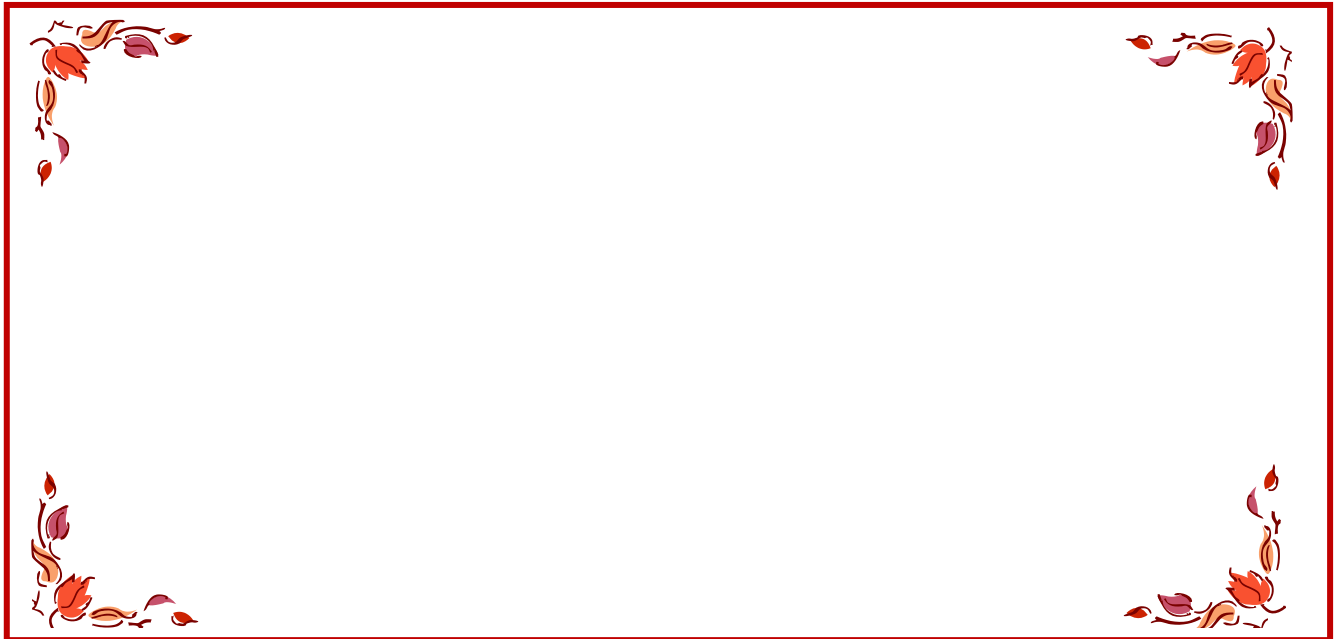
