For those of you who didn't know Gordon that well, below is a repeat of his Member Profile which was published in "Woodnews" # 1706 issued in June, 2017.

Gordon was born in Edinburgh, Scotland on the 9th August, 1935.

He emigrated with his parents to Australia in November of that same year.

During his early years he lived in several places and attended Primary Schools at Bellevue Hill (Sydney), Pretty Beach (Central Coast), Ormond East (Melbourne), and Randwick (Sydney).

His Secondary education from 1948-52 was at Sydney Boys High after which he attended Sydney Teachers' College from 1953-55. Gordon's specialty was P.E. and Geography.

Gordon spent his working life Teaching, Lecturing and Studying - all in the field of Education. His career took him to the following places: -

- 1956 1958 South Sydney's Randwick Boys High.
- 1958 1960 Quirindi High School.
- 1961 1966 University of Oregon (USA) where he obtained a Bachelor of Science Degree (B.Sc.) followed by a Master's Degree in Science (M.Sc.).
- 1966 1972 Sydney Teachers College and Sydney University as a Lecturer.
- 1973 1974 Foreign Student Scholarship University of Oregon (Dip.Ed.).
- 1975 1994 University of Western Sydney Departmental Head.
- 1995 1998 University of Newcastle Part-time Lecturer in Sport Sciences.

In Sport, Gordon's career was no less significant.

He was involved in cricket, Rugby, Swimming, Tennis (just kidding), Golf and Basketball either as a player or administrator.

In <u>Cricket</u>, Gordon played in a Sydney representative side against Wollongong in 1947. In the 1951-1952 seasons he represented Sydney High School's 1st Grade side.

In <u>**Rugby**</u>, Gordon represented Combined High Schools 1st XV in 1952. He played with the Wallaroos NSW Rep side in 1953 and with the Randwick 1st XV between 1954 and 1958. Between 1959 and 1960 he played with the Quirindi 1st XV and represented NSW Country in 1959. Lastly, he played for the University of Oregon side between 1961 and 1964. In <u>**Swimming**</u>, Gordon swam for the Sydney Teachers College's Relay Team between 1953 to 1955.

Later in life Gordon took to <u>**Golf**</u> on two fronts, both as a player and administrator. He was a runner up winner in the Foursome Championships at Muirfield and subsequently became the 1st Australian Women's Pro. Education Director, a position which he held for 10 years.

In **Basketball**, Gordon was a Fitness Advisor to Sydney Kings during the mid-1970's.

Apart from sport, Gordon has been involved in Community Service. He joined the Apex Club of Randwick in 1956 and subsequently transferred to Quirindi and Parramatta Clubs. He later joined Rotary at Carlingford where he became President and is currently a member of Nelson Bay Rotary.

Gordon was also an active Churchgoer both in Randwick and South Coogee where he met Ron Young and Sally Leibert (now Sally Dover).

He has also been involved with Tomaree College where he was President for 10 years and on the Committee for 20 years. He has also been the Journal Editor (ACHPER) on the NSW P.E. Association for 8 years.

Gordon is married to Lynne whom he met in the USA and they were married in Eugene, Oregon in 1963. They have two children, a daughter Julie, born in 1965 and a son Andrew, born in 1967. They built their first home in Australia at Carlingford in 1964. They have 4 grandchildren, 2 boys and 2 girls living in Sydney and Canberra.

Gordon has been retired for 21 years and now lives in Corlette where he enjoys all that Port Stephens has to offer. He admits he has limited woodworking skills but enjoys restoring old furniture and working with driftwood to make something creative.

Gordon received a <u>Medal of the Order of Australia</u> (OAM) award in the Australia Day Honours List of 2019 in recognition of his service to Sports Education. Well-deserved I say. Gordon was a great member who always contributed to the tone of meetings and Morning Teas. He has had a magnificent career both academically and in sport and we were fortunate to have him as a member. Although lacking in some woodworking skills he was always aided by other members when he wanted assistance. He loved dealing with driftwood and weathered timber. ➢ At left is a close-up of the Fractal Burning on one of the vases displayed by Roger Delaney. Once connected to the machine, the electric current burns a track between the 2 electrodes. It doesn't go in a straight line but meanders anywhere along the grain and every other nook and cranny creating images like tree branches, tree roots, etc... No two images are alike.

The Club has already decided not to purchase a machine due to the dangerous current that it produces (several thousand volts). Several people have been electrocuted throughout the world using these machines – even an electrician.

If you intend to purchase, borrow, or manufacture one of these gadgets, please be careful.

Roger purchased his own transformer and built his own machine, see picture below. The end result looks great and we congratulate Roger on his effort. Be careful Roger, it's a dangerous activity.



At left is a Clock made by Graeme Sosso. The timber is Kauri Pine with the wooden pointers made from Paddle Pop sticks. Wife Vera provided the chain from her jewellery collection. The end result is a great looking clock and again shows the skills and expertise of Graeme's work.
