


#### Two lovely Christmas cards received at the workshop

#### Presidents Annual Report for 2019-20 & 2020-21

The past 24 months have been a challenge for everyone in our community and the period also was a challenge for the Shire Woodworking Club. The pandemic caused long periods in both 2020 and 2021 where we saw the club closed and thus no activity in the workshop. On reflection, the Shire Woodworking Club has managed to complete numerous community projects throughout that period and still maintain a steady supply of toys and items to The Children' Hospital Randwick and other community organisations. A Covid19 Safety Plan was implemented, and I would like to thank all our members who have adhered to the various procedures that were required upon reopening the Workshop.

#### **Toymaking**

My thanks to the members of the Toymaking committee and all those members who made the extra effort to help.

The last Thursday in every month is a dedicated Toymaking day and although we lost over 30Thursdays due to Covid lockdown the Shire Woodworking Club managed to make a record number of toys. Your club has a number of members who continued to make items at home during the lockdown and these items boosted our stocks. The quality of the toys being made by members continues to improve each year. I am heartened by the number of members who turn up to assist in making and assembling toys.

Our Plank Competition each year enables the Club to have toy items of the highest quality and the standard is raised each year. My thanks to all those members who have participated in the annual event.

#### Safety

Safety continues to be central to how we operate the club. As we gain new members, this provides a challenge to ensure they are instructed on the correct and safe operation of the many machines. The induction program that has been developed for the club has established a index of all members and rec-

ords each members induction on each machine. In addition, the club continues to have a refresher course on each maxi day for the most used machines.

#### Equipment

In the past two years the Shire Woodworking Club has installed a new Hammer Band saw, a water-cooled variable frequency drive router, a Festool Domino machine, a Mirka Sanding system and an over-head Router sled. Ray Tregoning has been instrumental in building two new Multi-Function workbenches that allow clamping on the bench surface. All these items are very high quality and will remain valuable assets for many years to come. My thanks to David Edwards for the superb build of the Router sled.

#### **Solar Panels**

As a result of our successful application for a Federal Government grant The Shire Woodworking Club now has a solar panel system installed for the Workshop. The solar panels are of the latest design and their performance can be digitally monitored. We can now look forward to greatly reduced energy costs each year.

#### Gallery

In December 2020 we were successful in gaining the lease for the Gallery. This has immediately freed up additional space in the workshop and provided an ideal area for Maxi day presentations, display of finished items and a separate spacious eating area. This new building has opened up many new avenues for our club and is a milestone achievement. We were successfully in applying for a grant for various items relating to the Gallery. We have installed a new TV in the Gallery to enable safety and equipment videos to be shown along with other entertainment videos. New blinds were installed along with an expandable safety fence. In addition, the Gallery kitchen has had a new instant hot water system installed. The ability to permanently display items that have been made by the club is a huge step forward and allows the Club to open the Gallery to the public to purchase items.

#### **Future**

The consolidation of Land Titles for the two buildings has been completed in the first step of our vision to join the two buildings. There are many steps we have to take to complete the addition and fundraising will be essential to allow this development. We are in the process of obtaining preliminary design concepts to obtain overall cost estimates as one of the initial steps. The Shire Woodworking Club acknowledges the continued support we receive from the Sutherland Shire Council regarding this project.

#### **Finances**

I am pleased to report The Shire Woodworking Club has managed to maintain a healthy have bank balance despite there being no Gymea Fair or Bunnings sausage sizzles for two years. These events have been our major fund raising events in the past.

My thanks to all members for your participation in our club.

There are many members who continually contribute in many ways to our club. Special mention is made of those members outside the Executive who are always willing to put their hand up for the benefit of the club. Ray Tregoning never ceases to amaze with the workload he volunteers and the assistance he gives to all members. Richard Cain has always looked after our catering requirements and is renowned for finding additional supplies. Bob Quigley will fix anything that has wires attached to it and always assists any member needing help. Neil Mathews volunteers the odious task of trying to get some respectable order in the storeroom and also is on hand when catering is required. Thank you, Peter Mott for the many contributions you make including the regular maintenance of the dust filters and managing the Maxi day raffles. Maurice Smith for successfully taking on the important role of Editor Sawdust & Shavings and his enthusiasm in greeting new members.

Finally, my thanks to the members of the Executive who have guided our club over many years. Graham Ethell has an astonishing workload as Secretary and is always organising the next steps we have to take. Alan Ritchie for the way he has performed the role of Treasurer and providing general advice. Roger Dixon for continuing to maintain the New Member Induction Program and stepping in when any repair to equipment is required. Malcolm Armstrong for his service as Vice President and his organising of Toymaking activities, Finally to both Ray DeMarco and Barry Gardner for their many years of service to our club

Ray De Marco was President for seven years and guided the transition of the original Triton Owners Club at Oyster Bay to the Shire Woodworking Club here at Lilli Pilli. Barry Gardner created the original Sawdust & Shavings Newsletter and this has become an essential part our clubs history. My thanks to Ray and Barry for their service to our club.

## Treasurer's Report for Financial Years 2019-20 & 2020-21

Although both 2019-20 and 2020-21 financial years were impacted severely by the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns, the Club had two relatively successful years.

In the financial year to June 2020 total fundraising events were impacted resulting in a drop of over 30% from 2019. Total income dropped nearly 25%. However, expenses were only 8% less. This meant we had a modest operating surplus.

In the financial year to June 2021 we had a reduction of income of about 14% (compared to the previous - 2020–21 year). Expenses dropped by 21% This resulted in an even more modest operating surplus.

In addition to operating expenses in both years, we spent another \$12,000 on capital items including: a Mirka sanding system; a Domino machine; new guide rails for the table saw; a dust collector upgrade; and a TV, advertising banner, blinds and hot water system for the Gallery. Some of that capital expenditure was covered by grants received from various governmental bodies.

Despite the reduction in income the Club's finances are healthy with total funds available at the end of the 2020-21 are sufficient to cover any likely expenses.

# 2021 Plank Competition Photos and Reports

Photos and reports carried over from December 2021

#### Tom Croucher's Land Rovers

When Barry Gardner gave me a set of plans for a Land Rover I thought "that looks easy enough" – it was far from easy. Barry then gave me some excellent advice suggesting that I Google old Land Rovers and change the plans so that I copy the features of a specific Series of Land Rover and not just a generic image. I chose the Series 2 from 1960, and that increased the degree of difficulty. H'mm maybe I shouldn't have thanked Barry for that suggestion.

There were many challenges:

- The degree of accuracy needed to get all 35 parts of each Land Rover to fit together nicely.
- Making the 25 wheels, for 5 vehicles, so that each set of wheels had the exact same diameter.
- Learning which special cuts to do on what ma-

chine and then learning how to use the machine.

 Racing against the clock to finish and trying not to worry too much about the inevitable mistakes.

I want to thank the club members who were so prepared to help and to teach me. I would not have got there without them.



### Steve Lansley's Rolls Royce 1908 Silver Ghost

Steve's report does not do justice to the gorgeous model of the 1908 Rolls Royce Silver Cloud.

"The Rolls started with a plan out of the SWC library, this has many metal parts screws, bolts and plates. My first step was to shrink the size to 50%, redesign to remove all metal components, then studied pictures of the real thing to make my model more authentic.



I cut the parts using my scroll saw, then assembled and air brushed the model. I then mad a base and sprayed that with clear Estapol."

# Bob Winwood made some tremendous toy trucks

This is my second attempt at the Plank Competition and surprisingly coming away with 1st place in category 3 last year, I was looking forward to this year's competition. The first hurdle was to determine what to make and as



creative talents are not one of my strengths I returned back to a book I found in our library, 'Tremendous Toy Trucks'

Unfortunately, all the plans' dimensions are imperial so some time was spent converting them to metric.

The next challenge was to prepare a cutting list to ensure there was enough timber. This took some time to carry out but was worth the time it took to finalise. I decided to make two trucks and managed to ensure that I had sufficient timber for all the pieces with the timber provided. The only additional pieces of timber were the dowel for the wheel pins and exhausts.

Fortunately, I managed to cut the pieces at the workshop before the COVID lockdown started and I did the final assembly at home. The finish was with orange oil. Luckily the plank I received had a nice grain which gave the cabins on the trucks a great finish.

Once again it was a lot of fun to make.

#### Neil Mathews has started an earthmoving business

What toy(s) to make this year? I was looking for something possibly educational that would not be discarded in ten minutes. I saw a video of a kid having fun playing in a sand pit and sitting on a toy excavator and thought this is it. A kid could have lots of



fun with this while learning a number of skills, to dig up some sand, lift it and swivel, then dump the sand into his truck.

As usual I did not have a plan but worked out dimensions that would fit

my plank. Another 300mm would have been nice which would have allowed me to make the toy to suit an older child.

Construction was fairly basic but needed a number of pivots. I needed stainless steel furniture connectors that would give a smooth 6mm pivoting surface. I was unable to find anything suitable locally, so I went on line and imported these pivots from China. The wheels came from Bunnings. I wanted to use pushbike handgrips on the handles, but could not find any suitable red ones, so I used some red heat-shrink tubing instead.

The scoop needed to be functional and not made from timber. I made this from 1.2mm galvanised sheet metal. I made a cardboard template to test my dimensions, cut the sheet metal and used my bench vice and a block of hardwood to fold it to the metal was then primed and spray-painted with red gloss enamel. The toy is finished with several coats of Anchor satin enamel.

The excavator works to my satisfaction mechanically, but is yet to be tested by a suitable child who I believe will get a lot of enjoyment from it.
