How often does a wooden spoon prize for last place win first place?

It's a bizarre question. Think about it? How can a last place prize win first place? One answer is that it can happen if there is only one entrant. That wasn't the situation here. The solution to this puzzle is that a large wooden spoon made by Ray Tregoning as a prize for last place in a race won the 2002 Excellence Award.

Ray reports: Art Piece - Wooden Spoon

"Every December a group from our street (in Como) organise the Mangrove Island Regatta for canoes, kayaks, paddleboards, etc. It starts at the point on the western side of the Como railway bridge and goes west up the Woronora River around Mangrove Island and return, a distance of 1 nautical mile.

At the presentation of trophies, the suggestion was made to have a perpetual trophy for last place, traditionally called a wooden spoon. And that's why I drew up a pattern and cut it out of New Guinea Rosewood. Using the laser, Ian Rudd engraved the handle and 2 pieces of 3mm ply, one engraved with Last Place and the other with The Wooden Spoon. This can be hung or placed in a stand made from American White Oak.

The wooden handle was engraved and sprayed out with gold to expose the lettering with the whole thing coated with three coats of Anchor 100% Clear Gloss. Names of the recipients and years will be added, engraved on 3mm Ply each year."

Tom Croucher's Loch Ness Monster—Toys Excellence Award

The new version is an interesting toy, as it moves along, the flippers flap and the neck bobbles from side to side. It is a truly captivating toy that will make a child smile and keep entertained. Well done, Tom.

David Edwards—Furniture Excellence Award



The item pictured left is one of two side tables that David made. When David and his wife, Julie, downsized their home last year they also had to downsize furniture, and so it was that they needed two side tables. They are made using Tasmanian Blackwood.

As David indicated the timber was not cheap but by golly the result of this project more than paid for themselves with the stunning quality. Well done, David

Ian Rudd-Utility Excellence Award

This box has two drawers that open simultaneously from each end. The idea of how to make this box came from some clever packaging that I had received when purchasing a simple magnifying glass. The box uses



some very strong Mylar film in a loop and the drawers are fixed to the loop. Because of the loop,

when the top drawer is opened the bottom drawer is also opened. The box was sanded to a 400 grit finish and then finished with six coats of Feast Watson Satin Wipe On Poly.

Editor here: Definitely a unique box, it obviously appealed to lan's engineering background, beautifully made, as always.

Ray Tregoning—Collectible Award



Ray reports: "A 1948 Woody Wagon which I made for the 2022 Plank Competition, which I purchased from the Club.

It's made from the pine plank with drawings I purchased from Toys & Joys I America. It has been tricked up a bit from the drawings, with roof racks, surfboard, paddle, leather seats with white piping, gear stick, gear box and tailshaft, diff, pedal box, Esky, and Nike bag, all of which don't appear on their drawings, and I converted it to right hand drive.

It is finished with Jarrah water base stain and Anchor 100% Clear Gloss."

Editor here: For the photo opposite, Ray insisted that he be photographed wearing a shirt appropriate to the era. Of course, the shirt features the vehicle.

Geoff Tong—Woodturning Excellence Award

Geoff submitted 2 entries, both of which could have been entered in several Excellence Award categories. Both items are beautifully made, and are each worthy of an award. The vase shown won the award for Woodturning.



Geoff's report follows:

"There are 1039 pieces of different colour wood in this vase.

Most of vase is made up of simple basic 24 segment rings with a piece of brown veneer between the segments.

The feature ring was difficult to make and is the biggest feature ring I have made so far. It has a 290mm diameter and consists of 36 segments. Cutting a 5 degree angle on both sides of a thin and tall segment was extremely difficult but with assistance from Roger Dixon I got the job done.

To get the ribbed effect each segment of the feature ring had to be pre-turned. Timber used is mainly Solomon Island kauri and the finish is water based polyurethane gloss."

2022 Excellence Award Entries

Alan Ritchie Jewellery Box—Art Piece



Alan reports:

"The box carcase was made from some New Guinea rosewood the Club received. The corners were mitred and fitted with contrasting internal splines to strengthen them. Additional contrasting splines were added to the corners to act as the supports for the inner tray.

The brass hinges were supplied by Ian Rudd and open to 95 degrees so the lid could sit open without further support. The hinges were routed into place.

The inner tray was made from red river gum that was salvaged from my 35-year-old paling fence when the fence was replaced. The lid design was another Ian Rudd idea and was cut from two pieces of contrasting wood using a bandsaw.

The lid design was rebated into the lid. Contrasting legs were added as an additional feature. The box and inner tray were finished with several coats of wax and buffed to a satin finish. I was very pleased with the result."

Club Clothing

The following message was received from Club Secretary, Graham Ethelll.

Club members,

Previous Covid-related issues which prevented me from ordering Club clothing have now been resolved so I am now able to again take orders for Club clothing, ie shirts, jackets and aprons. So if you are interested, this is what is available - same as previous but marginally increased costs, which have not changed in the 5 years since I first started taking orders.

Mens' Polo shirts with pocket, Club name embroidered on pocket, your name above Cost \$30

Women's Polo shirts, no pocket, Club name embroidered on right, your name on left Cost \$30

Jackets - unisex, Club name embroidered on left Cost \$35

Aprons - unisex, Club name embroidered Cost \$20. One size fits all.

Please note:

We need at least 6 shirts to be ordered for the embroidery to be worthwhile for the person doing it, ie six all up, you don't have to order six for yourself!

Sizes:

Shirts: are the same as your usual shirt size, fit is pretty exact.

Jackets: are sized by men's sizes, ie SM, M, L, XL etc. They are a large fit and we've found you should order one size below your shirt size. I have one (new) size M in the Gallery from a previous order which you are welcome to try for fit if it's somewhere near your size. My jacket is size L and I'll have that with me when I'm at the Club also for you to try on if you wish.

Money is required up front for me to order for you. Please let me know size required, preferred name for the shirt, and pay cash to Alan or myself (preferred), or bank to Club account and let me know.

Deadline for orders (with money) is 18 February. NB: This is the only time this year you will be able to obtain the above Club clothing through me, next order will not be until 2024 at the earliest.

"This Lazy Susan has been made to go with my dining table is slightly different in the fact it is eight sided instead of round.

The base is made from Kauri; the top is spotted Gum, American White Oak, Baltic Pine and New Guinea Rosewood, with Hoop Pine and Merbau edge surrounds.

This has been coated with Polycure 3100 Gloss which is a modified Tung Oil used on the floor."

Our Safety Culture

A Safety Interaction

Your editor here in his personal capacity. One of the features of the Safety Culture process is the occurrence of Safety Interactions, whereby a member of the Safety Committee interacts with a club member using a piece of equipment. David Edwards wearing his Safety Committee hat, approached me to undertake a Safety Interaction as I was about to use the large table saw. I was more than happy to do so as I endorse the Club's desire to improve safety. The following are my recollections of the interaction, which lasted about 10 minutes.

An early question was when was I inducted on the table saw? It turns out that my induction was over 4 years ago. As was recently discussed in committee meeting we have agreed that members need to be re-inducted every two years. So that was an action item for me to follow up. This I have done subsequently with the assistance of Roger Dixon.

First up, David asked me questions that weren't specific to the table saw, such as the location of the Club's first Aid kit, the location of fire extinguishers, and so on. Then we got on to the specifics of the table saw. One of the questions that made me think was relating to the many jigs that we have in the Club that we use with the table saw. H'mm maybe I don't know them all as there are several that I rarely use.

Throughout the entire process, David was recording the results of the process in his phone using the Safety Culture software.

Overall the process was illuminating, not at all confrontational and I encourage members to participate as the opportunity arises. It is a good opportunity to refresh your knowledge.

Australian Open Tennis

It has been an interesting month for the absorption of the safety processes in the Club.

In January it was very hard to avoid hearing about the various tennis tournaments held in many parts of Australia. Your editor was one of the many Australians who saw some or all of various televised matches.

What is interesting from a safety point of view is that the provider of the Club's software, Safety Culture, was also the behind the scenes safety software provider at the Australian Open.

If you are interested in learning more, the website:

safetyculture.com/australian-open/ gives an insight into how the software is used in this high profile tennis event.

This promotion shows how adaptable the software is and how it makes its clear that it is not a "one size fits all". As your Club comes to embrace its facilities I'm certain that we will benefit as we continue to adopt the safety processes.

2023 Plank Competition Rules

The rules for the 2023 Plank Competition are set out below. Please note that rules 4. 6 and 7 are included for the first time.

TOYMAKING PLANK COMPETITION RULES FOR 2023

- 1. The purpose of the Competition, open to all members of the Shire Woodworking Club, is for members to enhance their woodworking skills, creativity and to have fun making toys .
- 2. The Competition will be conducted in three categories. Eligible members in each Category will be published in "Sawdust and Shavings". All entrants will be supplied with a plank of Radiata Pine approximately 1500mm x 290mm x 19mm or equivalent.
- 3. There is no restriction on the number, size, type and design of the entry providing it is used to make one or more toys for the Club. It is to be made predominantly from the timber supplied. Full use of the timber supplied should, where practical, be attempted and any remaining pieces are to be returned to the Club.
- 4. Any item submitted for judging in the competition that is not a toy, as determined by the Committee, will not be included in the judging process.
- 5. Finished entry/s are to be made available for judging on the September Maxi Day 9 September 2023. Entries in the Competition shall become the property of the Club to sell, or to dispose of, at the Club's discretion.
- 6. At the conclusion of the judging process any member submitting an entry may offer to purchase that entry for a nominal fee of \$50.
- Any member who takes a plank and does not submit an entry will be asked to, either:
 (a) return the plank, or (b) reimburse the Club a nominal fee of \$50.
- 8. Members present on the judging day will be entitled to vote on the entries in categories for which they have not submitted an entry. Procedures for the judging will be determined by the Committee and advised to members on the day, however members will be asked to award marks under three criteria:
 - Is it a good creative design including the entrant's creative design input?
 - Is it well made?
 - Is it well finished?
- 9. The winner, runner-up and third placegetter in each Category will be awarded prizes of a \$50, \$30 and \$20 respectively Bunnings Warehouse voucher.
- 10. Winners will progress to higher categories as follows:

 \bullet The 1^{st} and 2^{nd} prize winners in Category C will progress to Category B in the following year's competition.

 \bullet The $1^{\rm st}$ prize winner in Category B will progress to Category A in the following year's competition.

11. In the event of a complaint, the complainer is directed to Clause 1 of these Rules.
