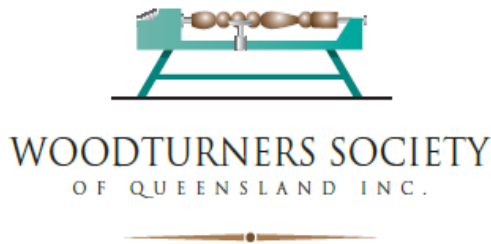
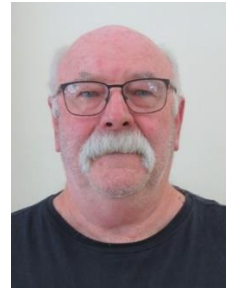

Treasurer's Report

After reporting a profit of over \$5,000 last month, June has seen a big turnaround, with several major expenses and average income (\$4,950). Major expenses were renewal of our Business and Public Liability insurance policies (\$7,425 and \$1,205 respectively), quarterly electricity bill (\$739), and final payment for extension of the Micronair dust collection to the downstairs workshop (\$2,920). The premium for the Business Insurance policy was \$1,500 more than last year, partly because of an increase in the contents value from \$221,000 to \$320,000 as a result of recent equipment purchases and general increases in equipment replacement costs. Total expenditure for the month was \$15,531, resulting in net loss of \$11,343. The overall result for the year to date is a loss of just under \$12,000, and our total bank balance is currently \$47,497. The Management Committee is considering possible increases in workshop and/or membership fees to improve our financial situation.

Presentation by Shae Miller – Clinical Nurse Consultant

On Tuesday, 13 June the morning Workshop broke early at 9.15am for Morning Tea and a presentation by Shae Miller of Metro South Health - Advance Care Planning Service.

The focus of the presentation was on the benefits of Advance Care Planning for each and every one of us and involved a detailed explanation of the advantages of understanding and completing the necessary forms to ensure that our choices about our future health care and financial arrangements are known to family and others involved in our care. In the case of health care, it may involve medical staff at Queensland hospitals.

By completing an *Advance Health Care Directive*, while you have the capacity to do so, you have the ability to make known your directions about your future health care and special health care to treat your medical and mental health conditions.

Shae carefully outlined the importance of appointing someone you trust to make important decisions for you during your lifetime in the event that you cannot do this for yourself. This may involve health matters and/or financial

matters and it is referred to an *Enduring Power of Attorney*.

A *Statement of Choices* form can also be completed to record views, wishes and preferences to guide or inform those who need to make health care decision for a person who is unable to make those decisions for themselves.

This is NOT How to Use a Drum Sander

Today, Tuesday 27 June, I went to use the dual Drum Sander only to find that it was unusable due to someone either putting through timber that had a stain/finish on it or over working it.

We are all supposed to have been accredited to use the WSQ machines and therefore there is no excuse for the sander to be in this condition. It is not a thicknesser and the height adjustment should not be moved more than the equivalent of 1 position on a clock face, e.g., 3 to 4 o'clock. Had I not noticed this problem till Thursday to run the Intro to Segmented Turning Course I would have had to cancel that session. As it is, I'll need to be at WSQ to change the sanding belts.

The June Demonstration

'From Woe to Go' - Skew Workshop conducted by Rob McKee

The June demonstration took the form of a workshop that focused on the 'dreaded' Skew. Rob McKee presented a workshop to the 8 members who nominated that was designed to cover the basic skew cuts. It is unfortunate that number was limited to 8, but it meant that Rob was able to get around to all of the participants and monitor progress on each of the exercises.

Rob organised the workshop so that he covered the sharpening of the skew and the importance of the angles on the tool. There was some considerable discussion on the advantages and disadvantages of the different types of skews, with attention paid to the difficulties of sharpening the oval skew, and the overall importance of honing skews. We had been invited to bring our kit of skews and to practice sharpening on them. It was a great opportunity to receive some expert guidance and come away with sharp skews with minimal facets.

We were then each presented with a square piece of pine that would be the evidence of our day's travail with the skew.

Rob demonstrated each of the exercises as we progressed through the day and carefully explained the presentation of the tool and reasons for mishaps with each cut.

We started off with a square shoulder cut which then morphed into a curved shoulder cut – just in case we ever want to turn a table leg. For most, it was a case of overcoming the trepidation of pushing the toe of the skew into a square piece of timber and then laying the tool to one side to cut a clean, even curve.

We then progressed to a planning cut. Some experienced more success than others, but it was a great opportunity to practice the technique and gain some confidence in using a very useful cut. Having gained a smooth surface on our sampler, we progressed to peeling cuts and developing an understanding of the joys of using the skew as a negative rake scraper.



The scene was then set for V-cuts, and the joys of making the sides even. Our V-cuts then became the first stage of cutting beads with the skew.





While Rob made it look very easy, for the rest of us it was a very 'intense' phase of the workshop with some odd-shaped beads and an odd groove or two across their surface.

In all, it was a very good workshop and each of us came away agreeing that lots of practice cuts and confidence are necessary before mastery of the skew can be claimed.

Show & Tell Forum – 17 June 2023

It was a rather quiet Show & Tell Forum on Saturday June 17, but there were spectacular items on display.

Peter Wyer brought along 3 very interesting pieces. The pyrography decoration on the small jacaranda beaker, featured in the May report, had been significantly added to. Peter reported that he had evened up the lines of decoration and used more texturing on the small motifs. He also brought in a beautiful turned box fashioned into apple shape. His third piece was a jacaranda rimmed bowl on which he had experimented with texturing using a rotary tool and finished it with Verdigris colouring. This proved to be a very effective embellishment on the bowl.



Charlie Edwards brought along a mystery. He confessed that he had no idea what the timber was but had started turning it years before and decided to get it out and give it another life. The timber is incredibly hard and is all end grain and, as a result, shavings do not come off the tool – just dust. To prove it, he brought along a container of dust. Just what the timber is remains a mystery – nobody could even offer a suggestion.



Harold Wiltshire brought his recently finished Pennsylvania Dutch Spice Cabinet. This really is a magnificent piece – a work of art. Already an accomplished woodworker, Harold had to teach himself a number of new skills and techniques, then source, purchase and learn to use some traditional hand tools, remember his schoolboy geometry to produce the arcs in the decorations on the doors and work out design dilemmas to achieve the end result.



He chose mahogany for the carcass of the cabinet and opted to use some of his collection of veneers to face the 13 drawers. Despite removing almost all of the drawers, Rob McGregor could not find the hidden compartment until Harold made the grand reveal.

As well as accommodating the precious spices of a household behind lock and key, these cabinets were also used to hide important documents and family treasures in a secret compartment. Its location was not obvious until Harold revealed it.

Some Facts about Recycling in Australia – Part 1

The following is some interesting information that I have learnt in the process of research for a grant. I was also alarmed by recent comments in the news and on radio. I have kept the search for Information relating to Australia. Hoping that we are better informed between what we can recycle and what we actually achieve.

Solar Panels

We are told that they can be recycled. A solar panel's aluminium frame and junction box (also known as a terminal box) are the components that are most commonly or easily recycled. The remaining **83% of a solar panel's materials (including glass, silicon, and polymer back sheeting) are not currently recyclable in Australia.** As confirmed by a Government source on radio they currently end up in landfill.

Plastics

How much plastic is recycled in Australia? 29% (22.60 million tonnes) of it goes straight to landfill while **only half is sent for recycling.**

An average Australian creates over half a ton (or 540 kgs) of trash each year. A typical Aussie household throws out over 1.20 tonnes of waste annually. Per capita, Australia consumes over 24 kg of plastic annually.

Which plastics are actually recycled? Generally, most recyclers accept **plastics #1 and #2.** Plastics #3 to #6 are more difficult to recycle, and some recycling centers do not process them. Plastic #7 is even more difficult to recycle and almost always excluded.
