Look after our dust extraction system -

We have recently had a major problem with the dust extraction system in the machinery shed. Specifically, the 5" duct from the thicknesser was totally blocked. It became necessary to cut the duct at the major elbow and it was found to be blocked by sheets of A4 paper that had been sucked in, crumpled and compressed, gradually blocking all flow through. Paper??? Yep, someone's project plans!!

It is believed it may have happened when that inlet was used as a floor vac before it was dedicated to the thicknesser. However, something as careless as that has cost hours of work.

Please take care with all the dust extraction systems. *The optimum word is "dust".* Let's keep it to that.

Vale Ken McKenzie - In December we lost a long time, highly regarded member of the Woodies. Ken passed away, aged 88. An excellent woodworker and especially renowned for his outstanding carving skills, Ken was a regular visitor to the Club and attended General Meetings until he was unable to drive in recent years. WORKSHOP SAFETY

Can you correctly identify these things at the Woodies?

If not, make an effort to find out. At some point it may save some trauma for yourself or others at the Club -

- 1. Where are fire extinguishers located? How many are there?
- 2. What sort of fire extinguishers are they?
- 3. Where are machinery central emergency **STOP** buttons located in workshops?

- 5. Where are the <u>three</u> first aid cabinets and a fire blanket located?
- Where is the *emergency evacuation area* for <u>all</u> <u>tenants</u> of the Jean Melzer Centre if there is a major emergency such as fire, major structural damage, bomb threat, gas or chemical leak, terrorism, etc.?
- 7. Where is the Woodies main electrical switchboard?
- 8. Where is the security system panel located and who is responsible for releasing and setting the alarm?
- 9. How many dust extractors do we have at the Club and where are they located?
- 10. **Here's a little self test to finish**—List 5 things you personally should *ALWAYS DO* at the Woodies and list 5 things you personally should *NEVER DO*.

VOODIES @ WORK

It began as a simple idea, and the idea was good. Covering the new hot water unit would hide the ugly pipes, and protect it from the harsh sun since a lot of it seemed to be plastic. And, if it was done well, the end result could be aesthetically pleasing.

The first step was to consult Syd Gordon. After a brief chat he drew up a simple design of slats as this would allow for the essential airflow while still achieving the objective. This only took two attempts as my first measurements were not correct. The fun and games had begun.

The next step was choosing the wood. For all intents and purposes this should have been straight forward. Talking to the guys in the timber saleyard I had to choose something that would withstand the weather. There were options but with the additional criteria for the finished project looking as good as it could possibly be, it seemed to me that Cyprus posts and Merbau slats was a really good combination.

The cheapest way of buying the Merbau was as wide pieces, so these had to be cut into thirds. And did I mention that each of the posts went through the thicknesser several times each side at 2.4 metres long?

All I can say is that it &#@#'s a fantastic way to learn which direction to turn the whee!! My thanks go to John DiStefano for help with cutting the slats to size; 900mm on the sides and 1m lengths on the front.

The slats had to slide into grooves routed into the Cyprus posts. Problem was I'd never used a router before - and it kind of scared me with that ultra sharp blade spinning at an incredible rate of knots, while screaming out "danger!!" to the uninitiated.

After a false start with a misunderstanding about the timing, Syd came to the rescue by telling me the basics and then leaving me to it. I guess he was a bit embarrassed by watching my legs shake. It turned out to be a half day job. But again, by the end of it my understanding and confidence had both increased considerably.

Once they had an exterior clear coat they looked beautiful. The colour and grain were very pleasing. Now they really DID look like they were worth \$50 each!

Just a pause here. Think about HOW you would go about constructing it from here. Because it's not as easy as it seems. I talked to John again and he suggested a fellow called Marc to lend a hand. All of this took time but I wasn't in any rush. I just wanted it done properly. And I knew in my heart of hearts that if it were left to me, my frustration level would have broken my poofwho valve. I'm not a woodworker. My previous profession before retirement was teaching. I'm better than average at wood turning because I've done it for years, but pulling this project together on my own ... yep, I had to use the guy.

Marc was good and a problem solver, albeit a bit slow because he's so fanatical about getting things perfect. Two of the posts had to be fixed to the brick wall. This took an afternoon and then needed adjusting after that. The front was completed first, with each piece liquid nailed and screwed into place.

The problem was the posts were just shy of 100mm square. So the solution was to counter sink each one. Are you beginning to see the picture?

Once the front was done we were scratching our heads about how to keep the structure stable while the sides were being completed. I think you can guess how we did this.

Putting wheels on the bottom was a good idea because sooner or later the heavy structure needs to be shifted. I just hope that come the day when the water heater needs to be replaced yet again, the creation of many minds and many hours will be able to fit around it, because you can bet your bottom dollar I won't be building another one!!

STAY COVID SAFE

<u>Covid has not gone away</u>, so we still need to be super diligent. Importantly, there are new variants of Covid around, and we can't be sure how vaccinations will relate to these, so be extra careful and don't risk your safety.

Over the Summer, out amongst people and in crowded areas, it's even more important to protect yourself. Don't feel embarrassed to wear a mask, even if those around you aren't. Regularly wash and sanitise hands, cough or sneeze into a tissue/ handkerchief or the crook of your arm. If you are feeling unwell, take a RAT test or arrange a PCR test and isolate if you come up positive. Although not mandated now, it's best for you and others if you stay at home and isolate for at least 5 days. Then complete at least two negative RATs before moving amongst people again.


If you do contract Covid, antiviral medications to treat COVID-19 are proven to save lives and reduce the risk of needing hospitalisation when taken early. People aged 70 and over are now eligible for antiviral medications.

GPs can prescribe antivirals and help eligible people plan to access them if they test positive for COVID-19. This can help you if you begin taking the medication within 5 days of becoming sick, when it will be most effective.

OLDEST TREES IN THE WORLD

There is a lot of controversy, and often not much real proof, about what is the oldest tree in the world. So, here's a few that supposedly hold that title.



Above: 1500 year old tree, located in South Africa. The locals say it's the "Oldest Living Thing On Earth".



At left: "The Oldest Tree in the World". It's in Tanzania and is claimed to be 6000 years old. Fact is, tree age can only really be ascertained by counting rings on a core. This tree hasn't had that done, nor is there any documentation to prove it's age.



Above: This particular long-lived oddity is a Patagonian cypress (Fitzroya cupressoides), a species known for its slow growth and exceptional size. Nicknamed the Gran Abuelo (great-grandfather) tree, it stands nearly 200 feet tall, features a trunk 13 feet thick, and has a perimeter of 36 feet. According to Jonathan Barichivich, a Chilean environmental scientist working at the Climate and

Environmental Sciences Laboratory in Paris, *the tree <u>may</u> <u>be up to 5,484 years old</u> - an age that would eclipse the current 'official??' record-holder, a bristlecone pine in eastern California, by more than 600 years.*

Then there's this one - Methuselah, "*the oldest known tree in the world*", is 4,850 years old, meaning it was established during Ancient Egypt and lived through the rise



Until 2013, Methuselah, an ancient bristlecone pine was the oldest known non-clonal organism on Earth. Methuselah was 4,789 years old when examined in 1957, with an estimated seeding date of 2833 BC. That makes Methuselah - commonly referred to as the oldest tree

and fall of the Roman empire.

in the world - 4,855 years old in 2023.

And of course there's this offering about Methuselah from - <u>ludvigpersson</u> - 'that's a dope ass tree b'cos we got one in Sweden called "old tjikko" that is 9,550 years old. No ring counting, but carbon dating'. **Ok, sure it is!!**
