CURRENT NEWS



Easter Shop - Because of the success of the Christmas Shop, the Committee has decided to run an Easter Shop on Saturday 30th and Sunday 31st March. It will be held at the Club, under the

same conditions at the Christmas Shop. More details will be provided closer to the event.

Shipping container - We have accepted a Grant of \$1000 by Bendigo Bank to contribute to the installation of a 40 ft shipping container. This will be used for storage of wood and other items that are cluttering our workshops. We have written approval from BCAL and groundworks and foundation compacting and concrete pads are being installed. The container will be delivered shortly afterwards and then working bees and support will be required for the fitout and transfer of materials/shelving and equipment.

New Workshop proposal - The planning to apply for a Men's Shed grant later in the year for a new workshop is well underway. We have both BCAL and BC Shire permission and an on-site visit by a building surveyor shortly. Plans are done and an engineer will be adapting these to meet regulations. It will be attached to the south side of the current machinery shed and will allow for more space for major equipment and benches to better cater especially for toy, carving, joinery & segmented turning groups.

Bunnings Sausage Sizzles - A big thank you to Peter and Alex for continuing the organisation and running of our Bunnings events. The last event in January cleared over \$1200. The next two sausage sizzle

rosters are up on the noticeboard. They are for April 7th and May 26th. It would be nice to see some new members involved with these, as it is often the same faces involved. The profits (almost \$6000 per year) from these events go a long way to keeping fees down and the Club well resourced.

Bunnings Easter Family Night - This will be on Thursday March 21st from 6pm to 8pm. Once again some helpers will be required. We will be able to display, sell toys, take orders and talk to potential members. Bunnings had over 420 children and adults at their Christmas Family Night, so this will hopefully be a worthwhile event for the Woodies.

Members' Meetings - Thanks to Lex for organising Michelle Debenham and a colleague from WELLWAYS at short notice after our booked speaker from Festool had to cancel. We will get him at a later time.

First Aid Course grant application - An application has been submitted to run a Level 1 First Aid Course for 20 members. If successful, the course will be run by BCAL over two days, each day for 10 participants. It will be a full day with lunch included and there will be no cost for participants. The course will cover first aid specifically related to our Woodies environment, CPR and defibrillator training. Never guaranteed success with grant applications these days, but I'm hopeful. More details when they come to hand.

Donation of bandsaw and pedestal drill - The Woodies would like to thank Neil Duncan from Cape Paterson for his generous donation of a Hafco bandsaw and Carbatec pedestal drill. These machines are only 6 years old, but haven't been used for 3 years as Neil's interests and personal circumstances changed. The Committee will determine how we will use these machines, once the container is sited.

Having an on-air presence with South Coast FM - The new manager of South Coast FM Tony John, has offered us the opportunity to have a regular time on-air with one of their presenters to talk about what is happening at the Woodies. This is ideal for promoting various aspects of the Club as well as upcoming special events like our Easter shop. It may be once a fortnight or perhaps less frequently and we would like to know if any Woodies member is interested in managing this.

I can't even remember what I did all day, but at least it's done!

MEMBER PROFILE



Neil Croll

I was brought up in the Melbourne suburb of Hawthorn; my father was a geologist and my mother a teacher. After leaving school I worked as a motor mechanic for several years before taking several jobs as a technician, mainly in scientific research projects. That was an exciting and challenging

life, but because of the uncertainties of research grant funding, I needed a more secure income so I decided to retrain as a mental health nurse.

Until then my hobbies had been motor racing (rallies, hill climbs and scrutineering), canoeing and bush walking, but nursing shifts made these difficult and I gradually drifted into more home-based activities. I moved around Melbourne a bit, then out to Wallan, Pretty Sally and Darraweit Guim, from where I commuted to Bendigo for work. The travelling was costly and tiring, but it was meeting my now-wife Katrina that finally impelled me to move to Bendigo.

Bendigo is a good place to live if you don't mind being that far from the sea, which we both did, so we planned to move somewhere near the sea. It seemed that the time would never be right but then I was offered a two-year contract in Hobart, Tasmania, so we started packing. Houses were scarce on the ground at that time and we ended up near the sea but in a house that we didn't much like, so a year later we were on the move, from Midway Point to Kingston. There we had water views, and could see the Sydney to Hobart boats entering the Derwent.

I had been sailing a Hartley TS16 trailer-sailer on Lake Eppalock before we moved to Tasmania; now we bought a traditionally-designed canoe-sterned 8.2 M (27 ft) boat and started sailing the D'Entrecasteaux Channel. I was a member of a yacht club, a cruising club and a traditional boat organisation and finding myself increasingly maintaining, repairing and restoring wooden boats. I was also exhibiting our own boat at the Wooden Boat Festivals. After my contract was over I worked in a couple of contract positions and as a freelance editor of research reports. This gave me time to join the crew of a square-rigged sailing boat, mainly involving myself in maintenance and repairs plus a bit of sailing. My role in that crew was analogous to the old Navy rank of carpenter's mate.

Up to that time I hadn't considered doing woodworking because whatever I had tried to make with wood had usually ended up as kindling, but now I began to take an interest. Why? I had always known my family's background but with online family history sources becoming widely available I decided to systematically research my own family. I found that I am descended from quite a long line of carpenters, joiners and wood carvers who worked in various places in north-east Scotland and Australia. My reaction was 'perhaps I should try that'.

Vague thought became slow action when I found an advertisement for an old lathe at a price that I thought pretty reasonable. But before I could make any more kindling or sawdust a couple of life changes intervened. For some years we had been aware that our time in Tasmania was limited, and we had been planning to move back to Victoria. We made several trips to Paynesville and had just started the process when Covid hit and the whole thing had to be put on hold. Even when restrictions eased a little we were unable to travel to look at properties, so eventually we bought our next house online. Travelling from Kingston to Paynesville was horrendous. The ferry ran into a full gale, green water burst over our cabin window, the ceilings leaked buckets and even many of the crew were seasick. When we finally landed we were unable to stop except for fuel, so we were extremely relieved to reach Paynesville.

In Paynesville I was able to start looking at information about how to do wood turning and try for myself. So I bought a beginner's set of lathe tools, looked up some You Tube videos and found that they made it look far easier than it really is. Clearly I needed help.

Paynesville is a very pretty place, but Covid had knocked the whole area around and it wasn't the same place we had been visiting. After a couple of years we decided to look around again, this time closer to Melbourne. Turning again to the net we found an interesting looking house in Wonthaggi and finally decided to buy it. We moved here last August and since then we've been amazed at how friendly and welcoming it is. Not the least of its attractions are the Wonthaggi Woodies and Wonthaggi Genealogy Inc., but the library, the food, the nearby beaches, the State Coal Mine and the many little towns in the area are all helping us realise that we've found our place at last.

My lathe unpacked again, it was time to actually start using it, but I definitely needed some help and structure. I found out about the Woodies and thought it was well above my level, but meeting people at the sale was encouraging enough to make me join, a decision I already value highly.



IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY EACH AND EVERY ONE OF US

It was brought to my attention that a new member doing an Induction session with Hartley, asked about evacuation procedures. Below is an extract from the <u>New Members Booklet</u>, that each new member gets once Membership is approved.

ALL WOODIES MEMBERS PLEASE HAVE A READ THROUGH THIS TO REFRESH YOUR UNDERSTANDING OF THE PROCEDURES. If there is an incident or emergency that occurs at BCAL, U3A or the radio station that may affect us, we will be notified by one of their staff and the procedures below will be followed.

Emergency Procedures

What are emergencies?

The club has considered the following emergencies as foreseeable and practically possible, and put procedures in place to deal with them:

- □ Non-medical Evacuation Emergencies (Fire, Flood, Chemical, major electrical)
- All members should make themselves aware of where fire extinguishers are located.
- ☐ Medical Emergencies (Heart attack, stroke, major accident, etc.)
- $_{\odot}$ A defibrillator is located in the meeting room and members will have the opportunity to be trained in its use as well as broader first aid procedures from time to time.
- ☐ Medical evacuation Emergencies
- See below.
- ☐ Minor Accidents & Incidents
- First Aid procedures
- □ Other Emergencies (personal attack, threats, burglaries, etc.)
- ☐ All accidents (minor and major) must be recorded in the incident report book in the meeting room.

Emergency Preparedness

- □ **Evacuations:** Where an evacuation is considered necessary, the supervisor in charge of the session will assume command of the members and visitors present, and must ensure all are evacuated to the emergency assembly area, which is at the extreme end of the car park to the North-East of the Woodcrafters buildings (White Road end). This is a reason why members must sign in when at the Club. That supervisor will also ensure that the appropriate emergency services are notified by calling 000.
- $\hfill \square$ Medical Emergencies: The session supervisor (or another

member with First Aid training) will immediately call 000 for an ambulance and take whatever other appropriate action is required.

□ **First Aid Incidents:** First Aid Kits are available in the workshops and the meeting room. All members should make themselves aware of the locations. Should these need to be used *in any way*, details must be provided in the report book kept with the first aid kit. The OH&S Officer will keep the kits fully stocked.

Emergency reporting

Following any emergency situation, a written report must be provided to the OH&S officer by Supervisors and/or witnesses for record keeping and any potential required follow-up, insurance, etc.

Working Alone

Club policy strictly states that no person is to work alone. At least two other Club members must be present in the workshop or vicinity of work being done by any member.

PLEASE NOTE that non-members and visitors are not allowed to use Club workshop machines or equipment for safety, and as a requirement of our insurance. The exception is for a display or demonstration undertaken with the express permission of the Committee.

Pointing to the bowl. he said, 'Miss Beatrice, I wonder if you would tell me about this'?


