If you do lock the spindle to take the chuck off, remember to unlock it afterwards. This is the responsibility of the person using the lathe in each session - not the Supervisor. When cleaning up, make sure you clean the common areas as well as close to your machine.

With some luck we will have our shipping container on site soon and we can start to use it for storage, and rearranging workshops a bit. Thanks to Frank Kisvarda for organising this. I think I have said enough for now.

The shop will be open from 10am to 4pm daily. Set up and drop off will be on Easter Friday. You may leave items at the Club on Thursday, but let a Supervisor know, ensure they are in a named box, and that fully completed sales cards and sheets are attached.

**New Sales Cards** - A new batch of cards has been purchased and are available in the meeting room, (<u>see what it looks like at bottom of page 5</u>). There are some changes - they are a little larger and there is space for the member's name on both sides. <u>Please</u> <u>only take the amount you will use NOW.</u>

At the Christmas sale, unfortunately there were numerous errors on cards and far too many without full details. We don't want to have to refuse/remove items because cards/sheets are incorrect, but please be considerate of those on duty and the Treasurer who have to unfairly interpret and make adjustments. If possible attach the card to your work - by sticky tape, rubber band, string, etc. It can save a lot of time by preventing things from being separated. Also if possible, write your name on the bottom of items.

CHECK YOUR SALES SHEETS AND CARDS TWICE TO MAKE SURE <u>ALL</u> DETAILS ARE SHOWN AND CORRECT. **Shipping container** - We have received \$1000 from Bendigo Bank and the foundations are completed. The container has been ordered and will be delivered in the next fortnight. It will be used for storage of wood and other items that are cluttering our workshops. There will be substantial manoeuvring of things, but it will create more practical space.

Working bees and support will be required for the transfer of materials, shelving and equipment, as well as painting and general fitout. When we have set things up ready to start we will let all members know what/when help would be appreciated.

**New Workshop proposal** - The planning is well underway. We now have professionally drawn plans and the next stage is to get engineering advice and then building approval. We already have both BCAL and BC Shire permission. Attached to the south side of the current machinery shed, it will allow for more space for major equipment and benches to better cater especially for toy, carving, joinery & segmented turning groups. We then need to apply for a Grant later in the year to go forward.

**Bunnings Sausage Sizzles** - The next two sausage sizzle rosters are up on the noticeboard. They are for April 7th and May 26th. It would be nice to see some new members involved with these, as it is often the same faces involved. The profits (almost \$6000 per year) from these events go a long way to keeping fees down and the Club well resourced.

**Bunnings Easter Family Night** - This will be on Thursday March 21st from 6pm to 8pm. Once again some helpers will be required. We will be able to display, sell toys, take orders and talk to potential members. Bunnings had over 420 children and adults at their Christmas Family Night, so this will hopefully be a worthwhile event for the Woodies. A roster is on the noticeboard, so please add your name.

**Members' Meetings** - As the March meeting was cancelled as per Club policy on Public Holidays, our next Members' Meeting will be on 8th April when we are hoping to have a manager from Total Tools and one or two of their reps. attending as speakers.

**Current Grant applications** - An application has been submitted for a Fed. Govt. Men's Shed Grant to run a Level 1 First Aid Course for 20 members. If successful, the course will be conducted by BCAL over two days, each day for catering for 10 participants. It will be a full day course with lunch provided and there will be zero cost for participants. Further details later. We're hoping for a positive response re. the grant.

An application has also been submitted for a BCSC Community Grant to replace our only lathe that isn't electronically speed controlled. We'll cross our fingers for that one too. No grants are certainties.

Annual Fees due on 31st March - Our annual Subs of \$70 are due this month. It is preferred if this is paid by direct deposit. We look forward to each of you continuing to be a valued Woodies member, however if anyone has difficulties with payment at this time, please speak confidentially with Frank Kisvarda. My parents were of Maltese descent born in Egypt who migrated to Australia in 1948, five years before I was born. Growing up in Burwood, my siblings and I enjoyed a fairly simple life as did many of our friends. We grew a lot of our own fruit and vegetables and kept a

few chickens. My maternal grandparents lived with us, so the work around the house and garden was shared, making it a little easier for all. While 'time saving' equipment wasn't readily available, life was pretty good.

Lex says it was very pale and insipid looking until he used dewaxed white shellac when the timber features seemed to burst into life. It was then sealed with EEE ultra shine wax to give it a silky smooth feel. He used this after great advice from Neil Ellis about the best ways to use his U-Beaut products. Lex is very pleased with the outcome, and is loathe to put anything on, or into it. Of course we know that he may likely be overruled on that one!







## So, what is it about HUON PINE that's so attractive?

Huon pines are some of the oldest living organisms on Earth. A stand of trees in excess of 10,500 years old was found in 1955 in western Tasmania on Mount Read. Each of the trees in this stand is a genetically identical male that has reproduced vegetatively.

Huon pine (Lagarostrobos franklinii) is only found in Tasmania, and there is no other species of Lagarostrobos in existence today. Huon is also known as Macquarie pine, although it is actually a podocarp (Podocarpaceae), not a true pine (Pinaceae).

Huon pine has a rich golden texture, and an exquisite smell and touch. A unique quality of Huon pine is the unusual figuring that sometimes occurs, giving the impression of birds' eyes on the surface of the wood. When this occurs, which is rare, it is actually called 'birds eye Huon pine', making it extremely valuable.

Estimates of the area of living Huon pine vary, but are in the order of 10,500 hectares. In addition there are about 800 hectares of standing, fire-killed pine. The current area of remaining pine is the remnant of a much wider original range that has been reduced by fire, inundation, logging and mining. Huon pines are the oldest living trees in Australia and the second oldest in the world - only the North American bristle cone lives longer. **Cont. Page 7**  **VOODIES** *(a)* **WORK**

From page 6 - Huon pines can live for 3,000 years, meaning some were seedlings before the Greeks invented democracy and well before Julius Caesar was born.

Huon Pine is one of the world's most durable timbers. Specimens have been dug up from under the soil and dated to 38,000 years old, still in excellent condition. It contains an oil – methyl eugenol – which makes it resistant to most boring insects, including termites and marine borers, and therefore very attractive to wooden boat builders. Huon pine timber is soft and light and extremely stable, making it wonderful furniture material.

These days, demand for Huon pine boards and slabs by contemporary furniture makers, both professional artisans and enthusiastic amateurs, greatly exceeds supply.

Because of the long life of individual trees, tree rings from Huon Pine have been used for dendrochronology to establish a record of climate variation.

Conservation - an estimated 15% of Huon's habitat has been lost through inundation for hydroelectric schemes and to fire over the past 100 years or so. Extensive logging in the past has removed nearly all large trees, but there is re-growth nearly everywhere. One stand of the species has been made available for access to craft wood from dead and downed timber under a strict licensing system. It is illegal to cut living trees.



#### Black Eggs of Mount Hakone

Woodies member Steve Edge, is currently in Japan and sent me the top left photo of a large rock egg. Apparently, the egg from the volcano adds seven years to your life if consumed at the site. But **not** the big display one! Great advertising ploy though. The standard size eggs can only be found in Owakudani, where they are cooked in the sulphur mine waters every day. Hens' eggs with light-coloured shells are immersed in the volcanic water for an hour at a temperature of 80°C. The iron contained in the sulphur penetrates the shell and starts to turn it black by means of a chemical reaction. After being steamed at 100°C for a further 15 minutes, the shell becomes black like coal. The inside of the egg remains white and yellow; only the shell changes colour.

### **USE THINGS PROPERLY PLEASE**

As you've read in Neil's President's Report, it is essential that members using lathes ALWAYS check a couple of things at the end of their session. The reasons should be obvious!!

1. Check that *the speed controller* is set to 0 or lowest speed. (*PLEASE make sure it is not accidently set to highest speed*.)

\*\*Conversely, before you start a lathe check the speed is set to 0, then work up to get the correct start speed for your work piece.

2. If you have used *the spindle lock*, check that it has been released. The location and operation of this lock varies from lathe to lathe. If unsure ask your Supervisor. This lock is mainly for indexing, but is more often used to assist in taking off accessories, usually the chuck.

> \*\*The result of starting the lathe with the lock engaged could cause damage to the pin or indexing rotor or worse, damage to the motor.
