Ray Bywaters' Cycle of Life

Ray reports: "After a lifetime as a smash repairer working with metal repairing and restoring motor cars, I was introduced to making model wooden vintage cars by a friend.

These models were from the early 1900's on, up to 1930's. I have made many models, from cars, to trucks and a golf buggy.

The inspiration for the "cycles of life" came when I saw a model of a Lambretta scooter in Vietnam, which I bought as a memento of the trip. When I returned home I thought I could make it. A friend sent a photo riding a wooden push bike in Greece and from there the idea of a range of cycles evolved.

Rosewood is the main timber used plus maple for the lighter parts. The base came from a timber show in Sydney. How to make the chain on the bike was a puzzle

Alan reports: "The timber came from the Silky Oak timber donated to the Club by the widow of deceased member, Ken Tyson.

The project design came from the magazine *Australian Woodsmith*, issue 111.

In cutting the timber for the

trivets extremely fine tolerances are needed. If you are going to make any of these trivets you will be well advised to make templates and get your saw blade height and cut width correct before proceeding.

The trivets were treated with a mixture of beeswax and mineral oil before I assembled the. No glue is needed, they are held together by friction and the tight fit."

until I thought of an elastic band, luckily it does not have to be road worthy. The Harley was a challenge for me as there are so many small parts involved especially the brake and clutch handles.

Finding the balance of sizes proved tricky, with several attempts on the Zimmer frame until it fitted in with the other models.

These were made at home in my garage, with very little equipment and many hours of trial and error.

Fortunately I found this club with its extensive range of equipment and helpful members."

A Cabinet Maker's Chest of Drawers

Maurice Smith made this version of the Cabinet Maker's Chest of Drawers. The project started in July 2022 and was completed in early March 2023.



Maurice reports: "I found the design and plans in a back issue of the Australian Woodsmith magazine. It was labelled as an Heirloom project. The end result of my many hours of labour is certainly worthy of that description.

While I followed the plans reasonably closely, I did make one major change. The plans called for many joints to be mortise and tenon; I opted instead for the use of dominos.

The project required numerous "firsts" for me, including using veneers glued to plywood (YouTube was a great resource), making panels (YouTube once again), the drawers bottoms are all covered with felt (thanks to YouTube and Ian Rudd).

The drawers knobs and handles are solid brass, purchased from Brass Plus on the Prices Highway, Tempe. Thanks to several Club members for that recommendation.

The lid is hinged and the hinges are those recommended to me by Ray Tregoning, I

Ian reports: "I have been experimenting with using the Laser to create inlays and decided to make a box where the four corners were all inlays. The design here is a lovely flame pattern and I used this on the laser to create the inlayed corners made from Australian Cedar. The body of the box is made from recycled kitchen cupboards that were made with Tasmanian Oak.

The lid is Australian Cedar with a Black Heart Sassafras insert. The internal tray is made from Huon Pine and the internals are lined with a red pigskin suede.

The box was sanded to about 400 grit and then three applications of OSMO Polyx oil.

If any members would like to make a box with inlays please let me know."

Gary Healey's report continues from page 6 I have used the grinder for sharpening turning chisels and gouges as well as my personal chisels and found it easy to use. The sharpening of turning gouge's is not that easy to use, but practice helps, it's worth persevering with.

I have not used the polishing wheel as yet, my work in progress, polishing compound required.

There are several YouTube videos on the internet if you are interested, search for "Record Power WG250 wet stone grinder user review.

I am happy to assist if you would like some help with setting it up."

Motivational thought for the day

Stelios made a lovely "simple" table

Stelios reports: "The table is made from Cypress that grew in Goulburn NSW. This I milled into timber in a few years ago. I then allowed the timber to season naturally.

I started making table in late 2022, and completed it in early 2023.

The finish applied is a clear hardwax oil."
