Based on the children's photo seen on page 1 Dave Edwards' train seem to be a hit. Looks like Dave knows his job in the foreseeable future.



The following report was received from David Edwards who heads our Safety Committee.

There's been a few things happening on the safety front within the Club over the past month or so. Firstly with the software platform that we have adopted, iAuditor has now changed its name to Safety Culture (SC) and if you'd like to have a look at some of their achievements both in Australia or around the world, go to <u>https://safetyculture.com/</u>.

Lessons Learnt - The old kitchen in the workshop is no longer in use as a kitchen. You may recall an incident last year whereby a plastic container was placed on the cooktop and the touch control buttons were inadvertently actuated. The heating elements started to melt the container resulting in thick black smoke being generated. Fortunately this was contained before a fire erupted and other than the container, there was no damage caused, but what are the lessons from this? With the kitchen no longer in use, we should have made sure that the power was off at the switchboard, and items should never be placed on a cooktop, whether at the club or at home. The power is now off at the switchboard, and a cover has been made for the cooktop to prevent items being placed on top. See the photo below.



Power Board Safety – According to Fire and Rescue NSW, problems with power boards can lead to electrical fires. To see a full list of these problems together with some tips, just enter "power board safety NSW" in your web browser. One of the problems they cite is "Dust build up in unused points", and the tip is to: "Place power boards on their sides to prevent dust build up in unused points." Given our workshop is a dusty environment, we've gone an extra step and installed safety blanking plugs in all unused points to prevent the ingress of dust. Maybe you should think about these tips at home as well.

Machinery Servicing – Typically we tend to fix our workshop machines when there is a breakdown and periodically there have been inspections in accordance with the manufacturers' recommendations. With the help of the Safety Culture platform, we have now entered all our machines onto a template and the periodic servicing will be scheduled at 6-month intervals. Roger Dixon will get reminders when they are due, and he will organise the servicing in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.

With the Safety Culture program, he can do this and record the results on his smart phone or tablet - the following screen shot (on the following page) shows a template example for the Makita Drop Saw and to the right you can see a representation of what Roger will see on his phone.

Servicing Section – This is an example and is for the Makita Drop Saw – it's repeated throughout the template for each machine. As you can see, it's been kept simple, and if need be, we can amend it based on experience going forward. In the mobile view on the right, I've selected yes for this question and it triggers the need to create an action.



Barry Gardner reports: What is it? It is an "Eclipse 38" Saw Tooth Sharpener. We have no instruction manual to advise how to use them. I was able to find some details on the web. Two posts in reply to somebody seeking an instruction manual maybe worth noting.

The first "In my experience, okish on larger teeth, hopeless on smaller. Take time to get the depth of cut right."

The second "The role of the Eclipse sharpener is to control fleam angle, which is by far the easiest of the 3 angles to control. (rake, fleam, slope, as per <u>http://www.blackburntools.com/articles/... index.html</u>) And it's physically intrusive, making placement and "tweaking" of the stroke to control teeth spacing difficult. AND it needs special files. I don't like it, as you may have surmised."

Should we create a Club cabinet for loose tools that seem to be a good idea but never likely to be used??? *Barry Gardner*

Ian Rudd's Banksia Cone Box

Ian showed this beautiful box in November's Show & Tell but Ian's report was delayed. The box is lovely and definitely worth showing in detail.





Ian Rudd reports: This box was made from New Guinea Rosewood and is lined with a red pigskin suede. The accents in the lid were made from Rock Maple to give the contrast. The box has very good quality brass hinges that open to 95 degrees. The hinges are installed using an 8mm diameter router bit set to the depth of the hinge.

There was a 10mm deep pocket routed into the lid with the rounded corners made square using a chisel. Banksia nuts were sliced to the correct thickness and fitted into the pocket. The box was then finished to 400 grit and then coated with multiple applications of Wipe On Poly.

Editor here: Definitely a beautiful box
