

May Meeting

Some Important information from the Management Committee meeting

1. Feedback on the Mother's Day Market indicates that we need to ensure that we have appropriate, small, relatively inexpensive items for sale at future markets.
2. The new Beginner Training Courses will commence on Monday evening 30 May and Tuesday afternoon 7 June.
3. The Pyrography Course is still short of a couple of participants but will proceed. Any interested members should contact Rosie Thornton.
4. The Moreton Machine Tools Trophy will be retired from the Competition trophies and be replaced by a Vicmarc Trophy. Negotiations on the details are continuing with Vicmarc.
5. Georgie Crossley has volunteered to take the photos for the Competition.
6. Reg Weber submitted a detailed plan for the accreditation of members to use machinery at Pine St. This will be finalized next meeting.

7. The 2022 audit of the Safety Manual and the Workshop Code of Conduct was ratified.
8. The First Aid refresher for Convenors is in the process of being scheduled. The emphasis will be on resuscitation and use of the defibrillator.
9. A Fire Audit has been scheduled by the contractors for BCC for Thursday, 26 May.
10. A spiral head cutter is to be fitted to the Planer/Thicknesser.

Pyrography Course

Would you like to learn or develop your pyrography skills?

Rosie Thornton has just the course for you. She is organizing a 6-week course at Pine Street that will cover the basics you will need to become proficient in the art of wood burning. The number of participants will be limited to between 6 and 8 to ensure that all participants have lots of opportunities for individual attention from the tutor.

The course will run on Tuesday afternoons from 12.30 until 2.30pm. It will be a hands-on course conducted by Lyn Keidel of the Ipswich Woodcrafts Club. Lyn will cover the basics of using the pyrography machine so that you can make the most of its capabilities and experience the use of the various tips to give different effects. The selection and preparation of the timber to be used will also be covered, though pyrography can be used on paper, leather, and other materials to great effect.

No drawing skills are required for pyrography, though of course they do help. Often images are traced onto the timber or other medium and then the learned skill of using the various tips comes into play. However, there is plenty of scope to use artistic talent and creativity in pyrography.

Some of you may not be particularly interested in producing pictures as such, but very interested in using pyrography to embellish, or even sign, your turning or other woodcrafts. These elements will also be covered in this course.

The techniques of using positive and negative space will also be covered in the course.

The cost of the course is \$30 which will cover the cost of the timber used in the class as well as sundry expenses. The usual workshop fee of \$5 will also be payable by each participant each week.

If you have your own pyrography machine and tips it would be a good idea to bring it along, although WSQ does have 3 machines that can be used.

Show & Tell Forum

Saturday, 21 May wasn't just Election Day – it was our monthly Show & Tell Forum. I am assuming that the constant rain and the obligation of civic duty kept most of our members from Pine Street on that day.

However, those of us who were there had a very interesting morning. Peter Wyer brought along his delightful animal menagerie and there was much discussion on how to affix the ears to the sheep and get the red coloured eyes for the rhino. Eventually, he confessed to using an old red knitting needle and turning it to size on his lathe.



It was lots of fun handling these very tactile little animals and talking about the different skills and techniques involved in making them.

The head of the rhino created very good discussion.

Don McMillan had been ridding through some boxes of turned items that his father, Don Snr., had produced and brought along some very fine examples of his work.

The lidded cup on the left was a particularly fine example of Don Snr's work, and how he obtained the angle of points on the foot in relation to the angle of the points of the lip of the cup was a very interesting discussion.

Likewise, the ball within the ball was also a great discussion. *(That would be a great demonstration if someone would volunteer to show us)*

The *banksia* vase was surely one of the biggest *banksia* pods, the walls of which were particularly thin.

John Carney's 3 corner bowl created much interest and will be the topic of the demonstration in October. John was looking for some advice on some issues that had arisen with the finish he applied. He was working with Liberon Finishing Oil and was not really satisfied with the end result. It was agreed that the recent endless rain could have affected the drying time between re-coating. It was also interesting to see the Liberon finish on the different timber of the 2 bowls that he had brought along.





Both bowls had the same number of coats of the oil, demonstrating that different qualities in timber often produces quite different results.

Gary Bidgood brought along some very interesting pieces that he made using his CNC machine and its 4 axis attachment. Gary is continuing to work on a commission to produce mallets for a collector. Currently, he is in the middle of an ancient Egyptian theme, inspired by columns that were featured in Egyptian temples. Look closely at the handles and you will see the traditional motif of the papyrus plant and the lotus flower.



Obviously, hours have been spent in programming the computer to produce the many intricate cuts required.



As well as the mallets, Gary brought along two bowls with the rims decorated with a relief of fruits, also courtesy of his CNC machine.

There was a great deal of discussion on CNC machines and the necessary computer programs, accessories and the costs involved.

All very interesting and adds a new dimension to woodturning.

Below are two articles setting out the **Judging Criteria** for both the Woodturning/Woodworking categories, and the Pyrography category. Copies of these articles have been given to the judges.

I would like to thank those members who have put up their hands to assist in the running of the Competition. Without their assistance, there would be no Competition. However, you will note from the above summary of dates, that **all**

entries must be placed in the WSQ clubrooms on or before Friday 15 July. Please ensure pieces are carefully wrapped and your name is clearly displayed on the box or package containing your entry/entries.

We would appreciate some assistance from members on the preceding Tuesday, 12 July and possibly on Friday 15 July with the setting up of the Auditorium in preparation for judging.

Trophies

There has been consideration of the relevance to members of some of the trophies awarded at our annual competitions. WSQ Management Committee has agreed that the Moreton Machinery Trophy will be retired. Moreton Machinery has, in the past, been a supporter of WSQ, however the company is no longer in business. WSQ has appreciated that association.

This trophy will be replaced by one reflecting the association WSQ enjoys and appreciates with Vicmarc. The form/style of a suitable trophy is being discussed with Vicmarc.

All members are encouraged to participate in this year's Competition. It is an opportunity to have your skills and abilities, experienced or novice, assessed by independent experienced judges.

Judging Criteria – Woodturning and Woodworking

Design:	Originality/Aesthetics: Material selection: Suitability for purpose; Centre of interest: Scale/Proportion: Balance: Marrying of surfaces: Line: Bead placement: Life of piece: Strength: Hidden balasts	100
Workmanship:	Evidence of good tool technique: Juxtaposition of Surfaces: Grain alignment: Precise definition of details: Smooth profiles: Turning to minimise sanding: Accuracy of like pieces (Identical pairs): Appropriate filling of defects.	100

Maximum points to award: 400

Judging Criteria - Pyrography

Pyrography:

This is the creating of a picture on some medium by using what is commonly referred to as a wood burner. Although the surface might be carved or curved (as on the outside of a vase), the work is in no way three dimensional. This is two-dimensional art. As in burned carvings, though, the burning must be clearly visible. Emphasis will be placed on the clearness of lines, shading and the use of texturing, illusion of depth and perspective and overall composition. A formal will not be considered unless it is a carved part of the composition. All finishes are allowed so long as the burning remains clearly visible.

Judging Criteria:

Composition/Design – 30%

- Arrangement and balance. This is how the elements of art and design – line, shape, colour, value, texture, and space are organised or composed according to the principles of art and design. These are balance, contrast, emphasis, movement, pattern, rhythm, unity/variety to give the piece structure and convey a message.



Originality & Creativity – 30%

- Impact on viewer, unique approach to subject matter ... is there a WOW factor?

Execution Quality – 30%

- Technique, craftsmanship, Excellence in skills in making the piece. Mastery of the medium.

Presentation – 10%

- Prepared and mounted neatly and securely to meet requirements.

Maximum points to award: 100

Lathe Maintenance Clinic

On the morning of Saturday May 7, a surprisingly small number (8 plus 2 on Zoom) of members attended WSQ Hall to participate in a Lathe Maintenance Clinic under the guidance of Reg Weber.

Reg started by saying that the lathe is a simple machine. We the audience looked at each other in doubt, but he explained that there is only one motor of a simple technology.


Reg structured the session by following the Lathe Condition Procedure he developed a number of years ago, and uses twice per year to good effect. There are 16 steps to follow. This writeup follows the process.

1 Run all functions of lathe and check for correct operation & smoothness of running



Reg Introduces the Lathe to the Attendees

- 2 Check Acceleration and deceleration of spindle speeds (variable speed lathe only)
- 3 Check drive pulleys and belts for wear and correct tension



Reg Explains How the Pulleys and Belts Work

- 4 Check index pin (stop pin) for wear and adjustment
- 5 Check headstock and tailstock internal tapers for wear and scoring – clean



Reg Cleans the Headstock Morse Taper

- 6 Check and clean spindle thread
- 7 Check bed and tool rest for nicks and burrs and lightly file if necessary



Reg Lightly files the Lathe bed

- 8 Check smoothness of tailstock quill and-ejection mechanism
- 9 Check clamping cam of tailstock and tool rest and adjust if necessary



Reg Reassembles the Tailstock Components

- 10 Check all mountings – motor ,lathe bench, etc
- 11 Blow out dust from motor (externally) and interior of lathe
- 12 Inspect electrical wiring and plugs visually for satisfactory condition
- 13 Check all leads for currently of testing tags (testing is required annually)
- 14 Lubricate lathe bed, tailstock quill and tool rest with dry lubricant

- 15 Work Light - check operation - Check electrical cord
- 16 Check dust extractor scoop, Mounting & Flex Ducting

The attendees gave Reg a well warranted round of applause for demystifying lathe maintenance, and we went home with more confidence to do maintenance on our own lathes than we started with.

Letters to the Editor



Dear Geoffrey,

This year's **Influenza A strain is going to be severe**. We are already seeing a significant rise in case numbers.

COVID-19 measures had reduced flu cases to almost nil since 2020 but more than 4,000 cases have already been reported in 2022. Cases in Queensland are **doubling every week**.

This strain can also cause **severe illness in younger people**, so it is especially important that they get vaccinated.

That's why the Palaszczuk Government is making **all influenza vaccines free** for anyone aged 6 – 64. Those outside of this age range are already covered for vaccinations under the National Immunisation Program.

Vaccines will be available **free from GP's and local pharmacies** until the end of June.
