


Refreshing the Club's safety focus

Over the years our club has had various safety and housekeeping processes in place to bring them to front of mind for members. Over time, these processes have fallen off the radar and in recent months there have been several instances of real accidents or near misses in the workshop.

These incidents spurred the Club Executive to renew the focus on safety by re-establishing a Safety Committee whose focus is on identifying how to make safety the number one priority for all people who attend the workshop.

The Safety Committee is considering the Club's past policies and processes. Essentially it will be starting afresh by using contemporary information technology to introduce an ongoing Safety Management System (SMS) that is scaled to suit our Club. This diagram below (adapted from FAA USA) provides a visual representation of an SMS and the relationships between the key components of Policy, Assurance, Promotion, and Risk.



So how are we going to do this? Well, there's a number of things being developed.

1. Firstly, the Safety Committee can't do it alone. It needs club members to be proactively involved as safety is the responsibility of everyone, and not only that, as we are all volunteers, we need to share the load.

2. An Audit program is being developed so that on a regular basis the various elements of the club's facilities and operations are checked for safety. These audits will be conducted by a Safety Committee member and with a different club member each time. The results of these audits will be shared with members via this newsletter.

3. A Safety Interaction program is also be-

ing developed whereby on a regular basis, a Safety Committee member and a club member will interact with another member who is using a piece of the club's machinery. This will be done in a non-confrontational way so that good practices are acknowledged and reinforced, and opportunities for improvement can be discussed. Various elements of these Interactions will be shared with members via this newsletter.

4. To keep track of all this, and to ensure that the SMS is on-going and not just another "flash in the pan", a software program called iAuditor is being introduced. iAuditor originated in Australia, its focus is on Safety in all its many aspects and is now used across many industries around the world. The best thing is that it is free for small organisations like our Club.

iAuditor has thousands of templates which are freely available for download and adaptation into our club environment and scale of operation. Templates for our Club audits and safety interactions are currently in development.

The beauty of iAuditor is that it is essentially paperless and once we set up our own club templates; the resulting audits, interactions and actions, are carried out using a smart mobile phone. A few dummy runs are to be conducted, and you may wish to participate in these.

5. The work of the Safety Committee has been presented to the Club Executive and the Executive has endorsed the approach being adopted.

There is work to do before it is fully implemented. We are taking care for the SMS to be regarded positively, and for it to be embraced by club members. If it is allowed to become onerous, bureaucratic, or confrontational, it will fail, and we cannot allow that to happen.

This article is the first of a series that will emphasise the Club's renewed focus on safety and we look forward to keeping you abreast with the SMS and iAuditor journey within our club.

with various tools in his career as a heavy maintenance engineer for Qantas - it was my first time with a few of them. I bought a circular piece of pine and got to work. I learned to use the router for the edges, the jigsaw, Forstner bits to cut in the wine glass holders, the sanding belt, and the laser cutter / engraver. Lightburn whoa - what an interesting program! We also learned to use the domino machine to attach the legs together for stability. We used recessed magnets and antique hinges to attach the legs, added a leather strap piece with decorative studs to finish the piece. We coated it in food safe oil. Dad was instrumental in the design and construction of the piece, and I had a lot of fun perusing the internet for a pattern to use on the top. We feel very supported in our learning journey at the workshop - and appreciate that members are willing and keen to teach us newbies a thing or two!

I'm currently also working on an Ambulance Monopoly board game - and some baby toys for friends who are pregnant. I anticipate a lot more learning will be done along the way!"

Our guest speaker on MaxiDay 13 August was in fact one of our own members, Dr. Ron Cameron. Ron has an incredible pedigree in the nuclear industry and has held numerous senior executive positions in the industry in both Australia and overseas.

Ron's talk was engrossing and gave us all sorts of background that explained much of the energy issues impacting the world's energy needs and production. It is of particular interest



that a substantial part of Europe's energy baseload needs is produced by nuclear means.


Ron explained how the energy cost equation is complex and can be slanted to give the answer sought especially for old technology.
