CURRENT NEWS

Members' Meetings - The October Members' Meeting at Bunnings with Lee from Cabots doing a presentation, went very well. There were 20 members in attendance and everyone seemed to especially enjoy the hands on opportunities to try out the products and take home their own chopping board and a goodies bag from Bunnings. Thanks to Sally for facilitating this and we hope to arrange something similar in 2024.

Christmas function - Our annual Christmas function this year will be held at the Whalebone Hotel in Wonthaggi on Thursday 7th December beginning at 12 noon. The cost will be \$30 for 2 courses + bonbons and extras included. There is a sheet on the board to put down your name. Please make payments for this event by 1st December by EFTPOS at the Club, in cash to Neil Lenne or by direct deposit to the club account with the note **Xmas function**. The Club's Annual Award presentations will be made at this function and the raffle will be drawn.

Christmas Shop - After some consideration your Committee has decided that the Christmas Shop this year will be conducted at the Club. The Shop will be from Saturday 9th December until Saturday 23rd December. It's an ideal time to tap into Christmas shoppers and attract visitors holidaying in Wonthaggi. We had an opportunity to use the Goods Shed again, but it was felt the Club offered a lot of advantages with no costs involved. We have successfully conducted two similar events at the Club in recent years and hope that we may also conduct future displays and sales events here. This includes the possibility of having an Easter Sale next year. Advertising is essential and we are intending to spend some of the money saved by using our Club, to expand our advertising. We expect that members will also be prepared to take on advertising and publicity tasks. Remember, this event will not only allow members to sell some of their work, but also provide the Club with extra funds that keep membership fees down.

Shipping container and New Workshop - We have been offered a Grant by Bendigo Bank of \$1000 to install a 40' shipping container. This is substantially less than what we applied for, but we will likely accept this offer and work out how we can further subsidise the project. However, our current priority is the proposed new workshop and our application for a substantial amount from the Vic. Govt. Mens' Shed Development Grant, which is currently open. It is a lot of work and a major project and the Club will need to contribute substantially to get a Grant. However, health and safety is a priority at the Woodies and it is

felt our current space with increasing membership compromises the best working conditions we can provide. Applications are due in on 8th December and there are a number of Committee members who have taken on this task. We have building plans and a quote, permission from BCAL and at the moment an application has been lodged with Council. If approved there is then a process of getting building permits and a range of other quotes and requirements. We'll keep you updated on progress.

Woodies Annual Awards - The Club will once again be holding Woodies Woodcrafting Awards this year after a two year hiatus due to Covid restrictions. There will be some changes, including the introduction

of the George Hill Award. Details and guidelines have been emailed to all members and are also displayed on the Club noticeboard. Winners of each Award will have their name engraved on a plaque on the relevant Perpetual Trophy as well as receiving a framed certificate. An update on that is that Bunnings Wonthaggi have generously agreed to donate a \$50 gift card for each of the 4 Award winners. The submission date for the Okke Huitema and Harry Oates Awards will be 10th November. Awards will be presented at the annual Christmas function on 7th December. I notice that another Woodies Club calls their Awards the *Be In It Awards* let's try and emulate that and have as many members as possible submit their work and *be in it*.

Using timber from the Club - The Club has a lot of timber available for members to use ... and even more is on the way. The amount of dry wood in the storeroom is growing. However, if you would like to use something - please ask your Session Supervisor for approval and advice.

Timber from Inverloch - Thanks to those who assisted to bring all the timber back to the Club last weekend. It required 4 trailers and a ute, but hopefully will be worthwhile. Use the timber as you see fit for projects, however please don't spread it. It's neatly stacked, let's keep it that way. Although green, it is quality timber - Silky Oak, Golden Ash, Liquid Amber and fruit trees.

Newhaven Sales Event with Patchworkers - This event will be conducted over the 4 days of the Melbourne Cup long weekend from Saturday 4th Nov. to Tuesday 7th Nov. daily from 10am to 4pm. There will be two rostered sessions - 10am to 1pm and 1pm until 4pm. Frank Kisvarda and Neil Lenne are managing this event, so please direct any




The sculpture is made by Mel Day. It comprises a natural timber base infused with coloured resin. Then the glass bowl was heated until soft and shaped to fit exactly over the timber.

New Premium Qantas Service to Include Flight



National carrier Qantas has announced a special new top-end fare that will allow customers to enjoy a flight on an aeroplane with every flight purchased. It represents a step-up from standard Qantas fares, which include a flight confirmation email, but not the flight itself.

New CEO Vanessa Hudson said as the premium carrier in the market, Qantas was always looking for new ways to delight its customers. "We thought about different ways we can add value to the Qantas experience – a free snack, an extra luggage allowance ---- and then we had this idea of including an airline flight. It was quite a breakthrough moment," she said.

Customer services manager Elise Samadas said the new service was the result of extensive research. "We asked customers what they really want out of a flight, and being flown to their destination was right up at the top of the list, which surprised us," she said.

Ms Hudson said they were well set up to offer the service, given they already had aeroplanes. "I've always wondered why we had all of these aeroplanes, and now it just seems to make so much sense," she said.

However the new 'Flying-Class' fares will come at a premium cost, to reflect the extra service. Customers can choose to upgrade further, by having their baggage flown to the same destination as them.
