CURRENT NEWS

Bunnings Sausage Sizzles - Thanks to those who have supported recent events. At the AGM, the Treasurer made it very clear how important these events are to the finances of the Club - and to keeping our fees low. However, we still need more members to commit a little of their time to be involved. If you haven't yet this year, what about putting your name down for the November 28th BBQ??

Bunnings Fathers' Day event - This will be conducted at the new store on Thursday 31st August from 6pm to 8pm. We will have a small display of items made by members, promote the Club and have some toys for sale. We will not be assembling toys on that evening. We need helpers please - it's only two hours!

Vietnam Vets Open Day - This will be conducted on Sunday 10th September from 10am to 4pm. When the AGM participants were asked, there were plenty of offers to assist. It will soon be time to put your hand up again as we confirm the necessary support. We will be making toys as in the past as well as selling kits and made up toys. Three members of the pyrography group have already offered to burn names, etc. on toys. If you can help, please let Peter Myers know now so that he can plan well in advance.

BCAL Adult Learners Week events - This will be conducted on the Tuesday 5th and Wednesday 6th September. The Woodies have offered to open our facilities for visitors from 11am to 1pm. Apart from those in workshop sessions on those days, we will require a couple of 'extra' hands as guides and to ensure safety if visitors are around.

Members' Meetings - There are a few things at upcoming Members' Meetings to note. The October Members' Meeting will be at Bunnings with reps of Cabots doing a presentation. It will mean some minor changes in times and program - details later. In February we will have a demonstration by a Festool representative of their range of tools and machines.

Annual General Meeting - The minutes of the AGM were recently emailed to members. Thank you to the 34 members who attended and it was pleasing that all Committee positions have been filled.

Christmas function - Our annual Christmas function this year will be held at the Whalebone Hotel in Wonthaggi on Thursday 7th December. The cost will be \$30 for 2 courses + bon-bons and extras included. More details later.

Shipping container - Committee has decided to purchase and locate a 40' shipping container adjacent to our buildings to store timber and excess equipment and materials. This has become necessary as our storage space is reduced and timber left outside has been stolen. BCAL has provided their

permission, but this is all dependant on the outcome of a Grant application pending with Bendigo Bank.

Ray Oram's equipment - Thanks to everyone who supported the sale of Ray Oram's tools and equipment. A substantial amount of money was raised and Ray's workshop was uncluttered and cleaned up. I know Ray was very thankful for the help in getting all this done.

Woodies Annual Awards - The Club will once again be holding Woodies Woodcrafting Awards this year after a two year hiatus due to Covid restrictions. There will be some changes, including the introduction of the George Hill Award. Details, guidelines, dates for submissions, judging panel, trophies/prizes, etc. will be emailed shortly. The submission date for the Okke Huitema and Harry Oates Awards will be during the first week of November dependant on when the judges can get together. Awards will be presented at the annual Christmas function on 7th December

Visit By Tony Walker from TasTimber - Tony visited the Club and about 20 members came along and went away happy with some beautiful timber. See photos later in this Newsletter.

Using timber from the Club - The Club is gathering a lot of timber available for members to use. However, it's important to be aware of what can be taken and what can't. Timber in the storeroom - in the front horizontal shelves - may be used by members. The large blocks on the floor - see a Supervisor to get permission before using. In the vertical racks at the rear - pine is for use of the toymakers only. Other items may be available for use - see your Supervisor. Any timber stored outside is available for members' use. Shortly we will also be collecting a large amount of Silky Oak, Liquid Amber, Golden Ash and some smaller diameter fruit trees. It is recently felled green wood, cut into usable blocks for us, and members will be encouraged to take what they feel they can use, or wish to cut up and air dry at home. We will let everyone know when this becomes available and we may request some help with cartage from Inverloch.

SAVINGS ON EXPENDABLES

The club has expendable items purchased in bulk (sandpaper, super glue, Shellawax, EEE, etc.) for sale at Club cost price. We also have earmuffs, safety glasses and Covid-safe masks if you'd like to wear one. If you are interested in purchasing any of these items, see your session supervisor for prices and availability. ***If you have any thoughts about other items the Club could purchase in bulk for resale, speak to a Supervisor or to purchasing officer - Neil Bateman.***

Today there are hundreds of types of scams and scammers in our world. Being aware and being cautious is the best way not to become a victim. It's important to know how to spot them.

Almost everyone will come across a scam at some point – in Australia, more than \$3.1 billion was lost to scams in 2022, which was an 80% increase from 2021, according to a report from the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC).

If you believe you might have given money or personal information to a scammer, there are ways to limit the damage. Sometimes it might just be one stand-out suspicious element in a text message, an email or phone call that sets our alarm bells ringing and stops us from becoming the latest fraud statistic.

Scammers often create fake email addresses and phone numbers that make it seem as if their messages are genuine. Sometimes these email addresses might use the name of a trusted institution, but on closer inspection don't match up with genuine correspondence, so it's a good idea to look closely at the URL (sending address) of any suspicious emails.

Another scam, known as "Hi Mum" or "family impersonation", is where victims are contacted by a scammer posing as a family member or friend. The scammer will claim they have lost or damaged their phone and are making contact from a new number, or friend's phone. Then, once they have developed a rapport with their target, the scammer will ask for personal information such as photos for their social media profile or money to help urgently pay a bill, contractor or replace the phone.

The ACCC is urging people who receive suspicious messages from a number they don't recognise, to independently verify the contact. If you're contacted by someone claiming to be your son, daughter, relative or friend, start by calling them on the number already stored in your phone to confirm if it's no longer in use. If they pick up – you know it was a scam.

If unable to make contact, you should try a secondary contact method to verify who you're speaking to. If you still can't contact your family member or friend, consider asking a personal question a scammer couldn't know the answer to. Above all, never send or authorise money without being absolutely sure who you are sending it to.

WOODIES MEMBER PROFILE



Steve Edge

I was born in Wakefield, Yorkshire, England, a half a dozen days shy of Christmas, in 1958. When I was a toddler, my family moved on to Manchester. At the tender age of 10 the decision was made to up roots and head towards the land of milk and honey on an “assisted

passage” - later I learned I was a ten-pound POM. Years after that I discovered that POM stood for “Prisoner of Mother England,” as the first convicts were happy to have tattooed across their chests.

My first two years were spent in Cabramatta where I was teased without mercy for the way I spoke. I later learned to zip it and just listen to everyone else for a while. The next time I opened my mouth it came out 100% Ozzie. There is something of an irony that from those early days I developed a respect for language. Nobody could have guessed way back then that I would spend most of my professional life teaching it. And that a year of my 40 years as an English and Literature teacher would be spent returning to England to teach English to the English. Funny.

After these years we moved to Whyalla in South Australia, where I spent all my teenage years. I finished Year 12 at Stuart High School. During the next several years I trained in Adelaide and was married there in 1979. My love of learning has never really ended, and I can brag about three degrees and a Masters in Education.

Within a year of being married we moved to New Zealand where I taught for three years. Our son was born over there. Glenys worked as a midwife in the local hospital. After this I was tempted to take up an offer as a teaching Principal at an International School in Wewak, Papua New Guinea. I could easily write a novel of our three years there. We absolutely loved it, and it satisfied our mutual sense of adventure.

After returning to Australia, and as an aside, Glenys had to sign a document as my Australian wife, that she would teach me English. Again, funny. During our 22 years in Geelong our family was to grow with the addition of two beautiful girls who continue to bring us great joy.

Somewhere around the middle of my working life I was close to being “burned out”, being far too dedicated to my students perhaps, often working until late at night marking and making extensive comments on submitted essays. Glenys and I made the decision to step away from teaching and buy into a Franchise. There were around 400 to choose from back then, and for four years we operated the Nutshack franchise in Geelong. We also purchased five, two bedroomed units in Bell Post Hill and looked after them ourselves for eight years before selling for twice the

price we originally bought them for.

Our coming to live in Grantville is a very interesting story. Originally, Glenys’ parents had ‘discovered’ the area but our extended family put them off the move with the major argument being centred around the fact that it was too far away from everyone. We visited the area and could clearly see the beauty they were attracted by... but they ended up living in Kew before moving back to South Australia. When it came close to our retirement, the pull of the place was strong. The sea and the bush. Terrestrial orchids. Not that far from the big smoke. Other attractions. A complicated set of pressures by the BCSC eventually had us employ an architect and local builder to build our dream home in Grantville, where we have now lived for seven years.

The house was built, and close on its heels was a shed to house my woodworking toys. My woodturning began 20 years earlier when Glenys had shown an interest in wood turning. I bought her a lathe, but it turned out (punny eh?), that I used it more than she did. I got several beginning lessons from a neighbour across the road from our home in Geelong, and from then on it has mostly been a journey of being self-taught. My other woodworking knowledge is very limited but the enjoyment it gives me is immense.

My other interests are lawn bowling, though most of the ‘greens’ now are synthetic. In October, I’m going to compete in the Masters’ Games in Adelaide. Motor bike riding (I am the Secretary of the South Gippsland Ulysses Group and presently ride a Triumph 1050 Tiger Sport). I got my bike license at 16 and have been riding since. Bass Valley U3A – I am Secretary of this group and have run a Photography group for several years. My interest in photography began in High School and has ‘developed’ (another pun?) since then. Gardening and nature. Visit my home sometime and you’ll understand something of my passion here. Travelling. Probably visited in excess of 100 cities and dozens of countries. A source of great joy that Glenys shares with me. Water-colour painting that I took up when retiring at 60 years of age. And our four grandkids, two boys and two girls.

I joined the Corinella Woodies several years ago and was successful in securing several major Grants as Treasurer of the Group. One of our members was also part of the Wonthaggi Woodcrafters and spoke highly of the knowledge of the teachers at the group. I checked this out and concurred that his assessment was accurate, and that the friendliness was also very attractive. I have benefitted from this affable expertise for more than a year now and I am very grateful. My present projects mainly fall under the wings of both John and Syd, but the other leaders are also worth their weight in gold. I have been approached to be the Assistant Treasurer of our group, and this will be my small way of giving back, to reciprocate in part what has been given to me.

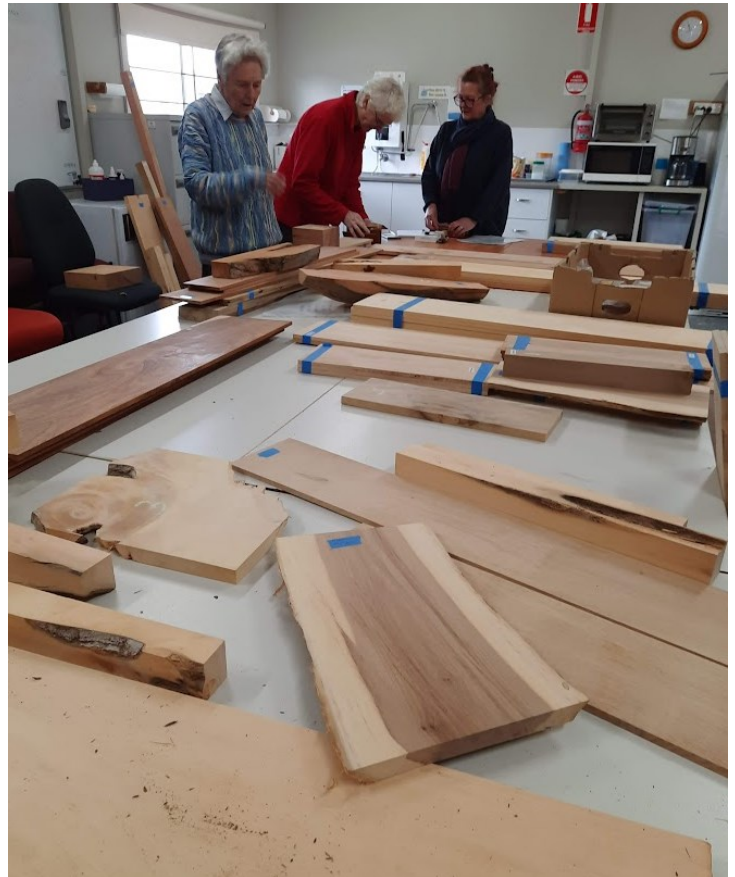


VISIT BY TasTimber

Below: Anne Ormshaw has made a beautiful, intricate 3D chopping board.

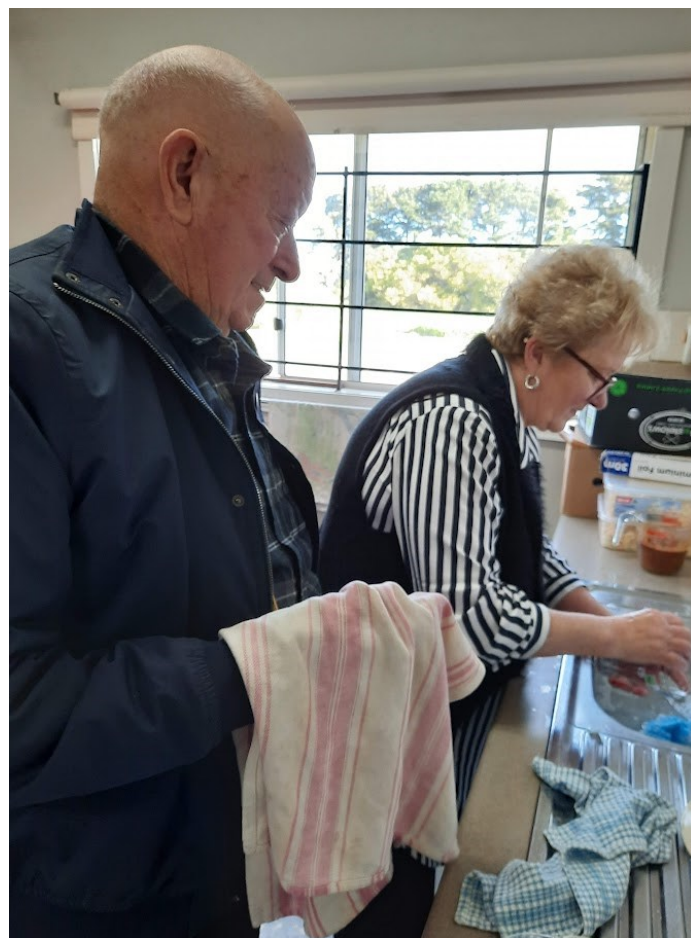

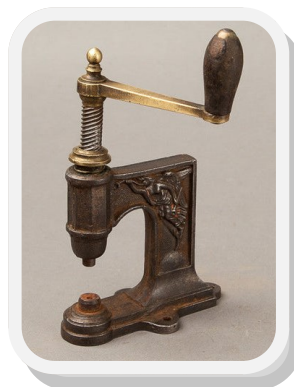

NEWSLETTER MEMBER PROFILES

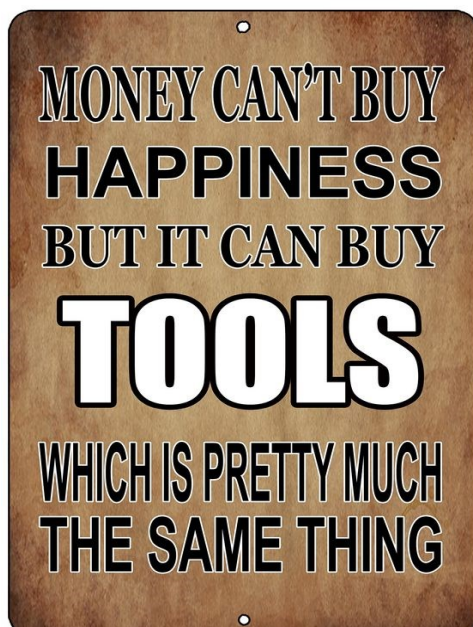

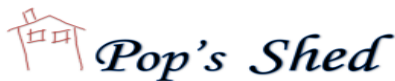
